

Simi Jacobs University of Birmingham





In recent years, misinformation about Israel and the Middle East has surfaced in architectural publications, encyclopedias, professional reference works, geography textbooks, travel guides, and even dictionaries. These events fuel anti-Israel and antisemitic prejudices as well as violence around the world.



AN INDIGENOUS PEOPLE RETURNS HOME

For two millennia, Jews in diasporic communities have proclaimed "next year in Jerusalem" at every Passover. Though Jews began returning to the Levant from Europe and the Middle East in the mid-1800s, Zionism as a national liberation movement did not officially materialize until the end of the 19th century. Zionists recognized that freedom and safety were only guaranteed through self-determination in their indigenous homeland — establishing a nation-state where Jews govern themselves in the land of Israel.

WHY ZIONISM?

As the Zionist movement gained momentum, many Jews acknowledged that the diaspora was not their home. In 1896, Theodor Herzl published Der Judenstaat (The State of the Jews), one of the earliest expressions of political Zionism. Jews from across the political spectrum began identifying with the Zionist movement. Some, like Ber Borochov, theorized a Marxist-Zionist amalgam; Rav Abraham Isaac Kook became a Zionist based on his faith; others, like Ahad Ha'am, saw a future Jewish state as an opportunity to enhance Jewish cultural identity, writing, "What is national freedom if not a people's inner freedom to cultivate its abilities along the beaten path of its history?"



"[Zionism] is essentially a movement to give to the Jew more, not less, freedom; it aims to enable the Jews to exercise the same right now exercised by practically every other people in the world: To live at their option either in the land of their fathers or in some other country; a right which members of small nations as well as of large, which Irish, Greek, Bulgarian, Serbian, or Belgian, may now exercise as fully as Germans or English."

THE PILLARS OF ZIONISM

Adopted by the Zionist General Council of the World Zionist Organization in June 2004:

- The unity of the Jewish people, its bond to its historic homeland Eretz Yisrael, and the centrality of the State of Israel and Jerusalem, its capital, in the nation's life.
- Aliyah to Israel from all countries and the effective integration of all immigrants into Israeli society.
- Strengthening Israel as a Jewish, Zionist, and democratic state and shaping it as an exemplary society with a unique moral and spiritual character, marked by mutual respect for the multi-faceted Jewish people, rooted in the vision of the prophets, striving for peace and contributing to the betterment of the world.
- Ensuring the future and the distinctiveness of the Jewish people by furthering Jewish, Hebrew, and Zionist education, fostering spiritual and cultural values, and teaching Hebrew as the national language.
- Nurturing mutual Jewish responsibility,
 defending the rights of Jews as individuals and
 as a nation, representing the national Zionist
 interests of the Jewish people, and struggling
 against all manifestations of antisemitism.
- Settling the country as an expression of practical Zionism.



THE NECESSITY OF LIBERATION

Historically, Jews suffered from oppression in various forms. In Europe, Jews were subjected to discrimination and pogroms by European rulers and the Church. They also faced second-class status in the Middle East. Systemic anti-Jewish oppression, also known as antisemitism, operates on institutional and societal levels. Jews were isolated, exploited, and used as scapegoats. They were not to be trusted and were commonly subjected to violence during civil unrest.



"Long before the emergence of Hitler I made the cause of Zionism mine because through it I saw a means of correcting a flagrant wrong ... The Jewish people alone has for centuries been in the anomalous position of being victimized and hounded as a people, though bereft of all the rights and protections which even the smallest people normally has ... Zionism offered the means of ending this discrimination. Through the return to the land to which they were bound by close historic ties."



Rampant antisemitism has also fueled a rise in violent attacks across the US and worldwide and has only increased since October 7th.

2025 ANTISEMITIC INCIDENTS:

- March 1, Paris, France: A 62-year-old Jewish man leaving a synagogue was physically and verbally assaulted, causing him to fall and briefly lose consciousness. The attacker reportedly shouted an ethnic slur during the attack.
- March 3, Zurich, Switzerland: A 15-year-old boy stabbed a Jewish man while shouting "death to Jews," and laughed with glee while being arrested.
- May 21, Washington, DC: A soon-to-be-engaged couple, both employees of the Israeli Embassy, were murdered outside an event at the Capital Jewish Museum. The gunman was heard shouting "Free Palestine" as he was arrested.
- June 1, Boulder, Colorado: A man from Egypt threw Molotov cocktails at peaceful demonstrators raising awareness for the remaining hostages in Gaza. The FBI reported the suspect screamed, "Free Palestine."

Zionist thinker Leon Pinsker (right) was among the first to conclude that Jews would only achieve emancipation through self-governance. Following pogroms across Russia in 1881, he argued that Jews would never achieve equality as minorities. David Ben-Gurion saw the scourge of the Holocaust and called for a Jewish revolution in 1944. He believed in bringing Jews together into one socialist Jewish state (Halutziut).



The Balfour Declaration


The Balfour Declaration was a letter sent by British Foreign Service Secretary Arthur James Balfour to Lord Walter Rothschild.


It was the first official
declaration of support by a
major political power for a
Jewish national homeland in the
land of Israel, then referred to
as Mandatory Palestine.

The Balfour Declaration was part of a legal process to statehood for the Yishuv (prestate Jewish areas in what is now the State of Israel).

The Declaration States:

"His Majesty's government view with favour the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, and will use their best endeavour to facilitate the achievement of this object, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine, or the rights and political status enjoyed by Jews in any other country."







JEWISH INDIGENOUS HISTORY

The Jewish town of Gamla suffered a devastating defeat during the Great Revolt in 67 AD. The destruction of the town is well documented by both Josephus and archeological findings which have unearthed one of the world's oldest synagogues.

Mizrahi Stories:

From expulsion to triumph, from persecution to freedom.



Over half of Israel's Jewish population is of Mizrahi descent. Various Arab nations expelled over 800,000 Jews from their counties.

Mizrahi and Sephardic Jews spoke many mother tongues: Arabic, Persian, Berber, Turkish, modern Aramaic, Ladino, Georgian, English, French, Italian, Greek, Russian, and Bulgarian. They were also fluent in Hebrew, as it was their language of prayer and liturgy.

In the years that followed Israel's declaration of independence, nearly 850,000 Mizrahi and Sephardic Jews from across the Arab and Muslim world were persecuted, dispossessed, and ethnically cleansed. Many traveled to the newly established Jewish state.



These forgotten refugees are part of a multi-colored cultural tapestry in Israel, and their stories are critical to those seeking a better grasp of Middle Eastern history.

THE IHRA DEFINITION OF ANTISEMITISM:

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW



The International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) is an organization combating Holocaust denial and antisemitism. It created a working definition of antisemitism outlining various forms in which it manifests in society. It also notes instances where anti-Israel/anti-Zionist rhetoric qualifies as antisemitic, and does not fall under "legitimate criticism of Israel." This includes vilifying Israel and Zionism in a similar manner to classic antisemitic tropes.

One part of the definition that is commonly misunderstood is its assertion that "denying the Jewish people their right to self-determination, e.g., by claiming that the existence of a State of Israel is a racist endeavour."

Critics believe this passage denies them the right to criticize Israel. They mean that they want the freedom to advocate for the end of the Jewish state with moral impunity.

The IHRA does not deny anyone the right to express themselves or criticize Israel as one does any other nation.





DOES THE IHRA SILENCE ISRAEL'S CRITICS?

Manifestations might include targeting the state of Israel, conceived as a Jewish collective. <u>However, criticism of Israel similar to that leveled against any other country cannot be regarded as antisemitic.</u>

The IHRA notes specific examples of when anti-Israel rhetoric becomes antisemitism:

Accusing Jews as a people of being responsible for real or imagined wrongdoing committed by a Jewish person, group, or even acts committed by non-Jews.

Accusing the Jewish people or the State of Israel of inventing, exaggerating, or distorting the Holocaust.



Holding Jews collectively responsible for Israel's actions.

Comparing Israeli policy to that of the Nazis.

Accusing Jews of having more loyalty to Israel or Jews worldwide than to their nations.



Denying the Jewish people the right to self-determination by claiming that Israel's existence is a racist endeavor.

Using the symbols and images associated with classic antisemitism to characterize Israel or Israelis.

Applying a double standard that requires behavior not expected or demanded of any other democratic nation.

HOW THE SOVIET UNION CREATED MODERN ANTI-ZIONISM





As Israel established itself as a Western ally, anti-Zionist conspiracy theories developed in the USSR to delegitimize Israel. The Soviets attempted to eradicate support for Jewish self-determination and erase ethnoreligious identity and religious practices.

The Soviet regime created propaganda materials, including flyers, books, and magazines in multiple languages, associating Zionism with racism, fascism, genocide, imperialism, colonialism, and apartheid. The USSR was also instrumental in the United Nations resolution that defined Zionism as racism — which was later repealed.



"Caution: Zionism (1971)!" described Zionists as representative of colonialist-imperialist powers, hostile toward the working people of Palestine, and cultivating an insatiable thirst for power. Yuriy Ivanov's book demonizes the Jewish religion. He argued that Zionism is fascism and the Israeli military came from the same source as West Germany's neo-Nazism.

Today's anti-Zionist rhetoric is nothing more than reprints of Soviet propaganda spread across social media, college campuses, and political discourse. It just serves to delegitimize Israel and stir hatred against Jews and the State of Israel.

ANTISEMITISM & ANTIZIONISM

Legitimate criticism of Israel is not antisemitic. In applications of anti-Zionism, however, there is little to no difference. To make such a distinction, one must be conscious of how anti-Zionism has become a modern manifestation of antisemitism.

STATEMENT: "[Israel] is a terror state that feeds on the blood of innocents." —Recep Tayyip Erdoğan, Ptresident of Turkey

PROBLEM: This is an example of Demonization. It is a clear reference to a classic blood libel. portraying Israel and Jews as an evil people who crave blood.

STATEMENT:President of South Africa Ramaphosa argues that South Africa is not committing genocide against White farmers using the same arguments that Israel used to refute the ICJ case brought against it by South Africa.

PROBLEM: This is an example of Double Standard because Ramaphosa is ok with these arguments on his own behalf, but not when Israel makes them.

STATEMENT: "The unprecedented scale of terror unleashed on Gaza since [Oct. 7] is beyond any justification."

STATEMENT: "The right of defense has become a right of vengeance."

PROBLEM: These are examples of delegitimization. Both quotes claim that Israel doesn't have the right to defend itself nor the justification for fighting Hamas. Essentially claiming that Israel either never was, or no longer is a legitimate state.

STATEMENT: CODEPINK posts a reel entitled "ICE stole a toddler!" attacking ICE for the separation of children from their parents. However, the account continues to support Hamas and has long since abandoned any calls for the return of the Israeli children that were kidnapped on October 7th.

PROBLEM: This is an example of double standards. They are silent on the kidnapping of children in Israel but speak out against ICE, all while the woman speaking wears a Free Palestine t-shirt. The hypocrisy is blatant.

DECONSTRUCT MODERN ANTISEMITISM WITH NATAN SHARANSKY'S "3 D'S TEST":

DELEGITIMIZATION Denying the Jewish people their basic right to self-determination,

freedom from exploitation, inequality, and danger. [OF ISRAEL]

DEMONIZATION Portraying Jews or Israel with sinister motives historically used to repress Jews, including but not limited to disloyalty, blood libels, [OF ISRAEL]

and control of institutions.

DOUBLE STANDARDS Isolating and targeting the Jewish State with a different set of [FOR ISRAEL] principles than other nations.

SECURITY CONSIDERATIONS

Reach out to your campus advisors regarding security needs. Not every event or university will need security. But if you do, here are a couple of things you need to know.

Before booking an event, verify with the school if your club can use campus police/security.

- Book security in advance by the hour to avoid issues.
- Provide details like date, time, location, speakers, and any security concerns.
- On event day, be courteous to security and offer food and drink if possible.

Consult the school administration before booking private security, as it may not be allowed for campus events.









The Importance of Co-Sponsorship

Forging relationships with other clubs and the student government can maximize the impact of your Israel group. Strong bilateral relationships can also assist with projects that require broader support from your community on campus.

Some examples include campaigning for the adoption of the IHRA definition of antisemitism, petitions, condemning campus antisemitism, and, of course, planning educational and cultural events.

INTERACTIVE & FUN CAMPUS TABLING IDEAS:

Current event tabling

Speak with your peers about current events in Israel and the region. This is a great way to get accurate information out.

Table with a speaker:

Bringing a speaker to campus? There's no better way to promote your event than to have the speaker table with you. Have them interact with students and be sure to have event flyers to hand out.

Campaign-Related Tabling:

Promoting Mizrahi Stories, Apartheid Week Exposed, and This Is Zionism. Great way to spread the word, correct misinformation, and engage with students who aren't Jewish.

Trivia table

See if your classmates can answer some questions about Israel and Zionism. Be sure to have Israeli treats to hand out.

Ask a soldier/ask an Israeli

Israel is too often misunderstood. Have an Israeli speak with students, tell the story of Israel, and have deep, wideranging conversations.



TIPS FOR TABLING/STALLS:

1. Location, location, location:

Set up a table in an area with lots of traffic.

2. Bring advertisements:

Print copies of your upcoming event, a petition, and sign-up forms, and other flyers.

3. Plan an "ask":

Think of a catchy phrase to attract people's attention.

HOW DOES TERRORISM IMPACT CIVILIAN LIVES?









Before October 7: A Society Under Threat

For years, Israelis, especially border communities, have endured rocket fire and violence that created a state of ongoing traumatic stress. Children showed alarmingly high rates of anxiety and trauma, while adults grappled with chronic hyper-vigilance and exhaustion. Though Israel developed emergency psychological services, long-term mental health care remained fragmented and insufficient, particularly outside urban centers.

After October 7: National Trauma & Shock

The Hamas attack marked the deadliest day for Jews since the Holocaust, triggering widespread national trauma. Over 1,200 people were killed, with many others kidnapped or displaced. Mental health crises surged across the country in children, survivors, and first responders. Existing psychological support systems were quickly overwhelmed, exposing deep gaps in trauma care and increasing calls for more mental health resources.

Hope, Healing, and Resilience

In response to this unprecedented crisis, Israeli society has begun to rebuild. Clinicians are adopting new trauma therapies and receiving advanced training. Community-based initiatives are fostering healing through school programs, peer networks, and spiritual spaces. Support from global Jewish communities continues to bolster these efforts, affirming that even amid profound suffering, collective strength and recovery are possible.

Terrorism doesn't just threaten lives; it reshapes societies. Israelis live with trauma that is sustained, personal, and collective. For student leaders, engaging with this reality means recognizing the emotional toll behind headlines. Supporting Israel means also understanding its pain—and the strength it takes to endure it.



THE PEER TECHNIQUE

Tabling requires us to discuss Israel. We have outlined the best practices to combat anti-Israel points with trial and error. You can't go wrong with PEER.

(P)EACE

The side that comes across as most for peace wins in most debates. Every other word out of your mouth should be "peace." Israel withdrew from the Gaza Strip in the hope that this would bring peace. Israel built a security fence to protect Jewish and Arab lives so they could live in peace. PM Netanyahu froze settlement construction for ten months, hoping the Palestinians would enter peace negotiations. Peace, peace, peace.

(E) MPATHY

For many years, Israel advocates would focus on the evils of the opposition. This turns off most students, who do not like to hear negative attacks and reject generalities about, for example, "the Arabs." Acknowledging that the other side has valid points and expressing sympathy for the Palestinian plight is more effective and accurate. This, too, should be in context. For example, Palestinian life in the disputed territories is indeed difficult, and part of that is due to the ongoing conflict. Still, it is also because the Palestinian Authority governs the West Bank and does not permit free speech, religion, a free press, women's rights, or gay rights. Most Palestinians would probably be happy to live in peace, but unfortunately, they have not had a leader with the vision and courage to negotiate an agreement and establish a Palestinian state. Practice language such as, "While I hear the pain of the Palestinians, I wonder if they can acknowledge the pain of Israeli victims of terror attacks or the innocent civilians in Sderot whose city is often bombarded with rockets."

(E) MOTION

Too often, those making a case for Israel recite historical facts and dry statistics that may be accurate but lack an emotional punch conveying the Israeli experience to the listener. For example, you can talk about the 10,000 rockets fired from Gaza into southern Israel, which sounds severe and may win some sympathy but is not as powerful as sharing their profound impact. Imagine hearing a rocket siren and only having 15 seconds to find shelter. What if you have an elderly parent or sibling in a wheelchair? How do you get them to safety? Nine-year-old Tzahar is a resident of Sderot. He is deaf and cannot hear the "Color Red" warning; as a result, he has been injured twice by Qassam rocket fire.

(R)HETORIC

Israel often faces difficult choices, so its actions are easy to critique by outsiders. Force people to put themselves in Israel's position and ask what they would do differently. Do you have a problem with Israel's reaction to Hamas firing rockets into Israeli homes, parks, and kindergartens? What would you do if someone shot bullets through your window daily? You say few Israelis have been hurt by the rockets; what if the shots didn't hit anyone in your house? Would you sit back and let your neighbor keep shooting at you, or would you try to stop them?

You may not convince everyone with the PEER technique, but you will persuade some — and become a more effective Israel advocate.

HOW TO TALK ABOUT ISRAEL

THE SITUATION

It is important to engage effectively in conversation about Israel and the conflict. When falsehoods go unchecked, they become normalized and create a toxic and even dangerous campus environment for Jewish students. When you lead with honesty and confidence, you're empowering others to do the same.

THE RIGHT MINDSET

- 1 An investigation of their beliefs rather than a confrontation.
- 2 Highlight the holes in their reasoning/argument by asking questions rather than imposing facts.
- 3 This is best for building understanding and softening opposition
- 4 Common Avenues: Tabling, Campus Media, Peer Conversations, engaging with community members, and university officials.

TAKING CONTROL

- 1 Clarifying Questions: This technique enables you to organize your thoughts while actively listening so they can't claim to be misrepresented.
- 2 Reasoning Questions: Challenge weak assumptions, expose contradictions and double standards, and spotlight unfair biases.
- 3 Leading Questions: Pin their ideas, forcing them to justify their arguments in response to your facts and arguments.

DETRACTOR TACTICS:

- 1 Claiming Moral Authority: Israel is the aggressor, Palestinians are the victims. Believing anything else is unethical and makes you evil.
- Appealing to Authority Figures: They cite NGO's, media outlets and scholars, in an attempt to gain credibility.
- 3 Dodging Rational Discussion: Instead of conversing they attack your credibility.
- 4 Moving Goal Posts: When challenged, they change the topic without addressing your argument.

PUTTING IT TO PRACTICE

- 1 Clarifying Questions: What do you mean by Genocide? In your view, where does Israel's "occupation" begin and end?
- Reasoning Questions: If Jewish voices matter, why do you dismiss Zionist Jewish voices who disagree with you?
- 3 Leading Question: You said Israel is committing apartheid, yet you admitted that Palestinian citizens of Israel have equal rights. How can both be true?

ISRAEL'S DETRACTORS ON CAMPUS



Double standards, bullying, and intimidation all have a similar purpose: The Destruction of the state of Israel. Groups such as Students for Justice in Palestine and Jewish Voice for Peace do not promote equality for Israelis and Palestinians or stand for human rights — which is evident by examining their rhetoric. With CAMERA's support, students like you are equipped with resources to publicly defend Israel against distortions on campus.

STUDENTS FOR JUSTICE IN PALESTINE



SJP is the largest anti-Israel student organization. Founded in 2001, with nearly 150 chapters at predominantly American universities, SJP supports the Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) campaign and has introduced divestment motions to student governments. SJP also organizes events that accuse Israel of war crimes, apartheid, and genocide.

WHAT IS BDS?

The Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) campaign is a global campaign to degrade Israel by sanctioning its academic, cultural, and consumer exports.

BDS supports the Palestinian Right of Return, which would eliminate the only Jewish State.

BDS does not support a twostate solution, in which a Jewish state would exist alongside a Palestinian state. SJP demonizes Israel and its supporters through intimidation tactics and disseminates anti-Israel propaganda.

They support anti-normalization, opposing any engagement involving Israel or dialogue with Zionists or Israelis. At Columbia and other universities, SJP members have attempted to pressure administrations by occupying university buildings.


At George Mason University, the current SJP president and her sister, a former SJP president, were arrested following a raid on their home as part of a vandalism investigation. The raid reportedly uncovered firearms and flags associated with the terrorist organizations Hamas and Hezbollah.

SJP SUPPORTS TERRORISM

Students for Justice in Palestine chapters across the country glorify terrorism and the murder, butchery, and rape of Israeli civilians because it is part of their "resistance by any means necessary" and "resistance against the occupation" rhetoric. They regularly share content from the Palestinian Youth Movement and Within Our Lifetime, extremist organizations that advocate for violence against Zionists, and vilify Israel.









Additionally, certain SJP chapters have encouraged donations to organizations collecting funds for Gaza. The US prohibits knowingly "providing material support or resources to designated foreign terrorist organizations." They were also the organization behind various anti-Israel encampments on college campuses.

Is anyone under the illusion that SJP has no idea where these donations are actually going?

@cornell.sjp has since suspended Patreon donations without providing an explanation.





SJP TACTICS

Students for Justice in Palestine believe terrorism is justified. Its members employ specific words to elicit sympathy and support for their cause by excusing any Palestinian violence as a reaction to unprecedented oppression, occupation, and desperation for liberation.

To do this, they push a false moral binary with the Palestinians as the indigenous victims and Israel as the foreign, colonial perpetrators.



FRAMEWORKS

- Zionism is a settler-colonial project
- Israel is an apartheid state
- Ethnic-cleansing is an ongoing project
- The relationship between Palestinians and Israelis is disproportionate (plug in where relevant)

HOW DO WE TABLE? (CONT'D)

- 1. FRAMEWORK > FACTS
 - 1.1. framing the narrative as the state of Israel being a settler-colonial project who achieve and maintenances it rule through the forced expulsion and ethnic cleansing of Palestinians
- 2. WHY NOT FACTS?
 - 2.1. Zionists will constantly through decontextualized "facts" at us to try and reframe and mischaracterize the context of Palestine. Going back and forth is exhaustive and not strategic; rather, tablers she reclaim the narrative and pivot the conversation/contextualize by sharing a framework.
- 3. PRIMARY FRAMEWORKS

The National SJP organization's priority is not the facts, but a "framework," as seen above. They attempt to delegitimize Zionist voices by refusing to even engage in earnest. Instead, they prioritize public relations strategies.

SJP and their allies frame every action taken by Israel — no matter how positive or beneficial, as a false flag operation — a way to hide the nefarious deeds SJP will have you believe Israelis are carrying out. Anything worthy of criticism that Israel does, no matter how similar to the actions of any other Western democracy, is then presented as proof of its inherent evil.





THE SIP ROAD

Students for Justice in Palestine is a radical campus organization that lies and promotes violence against Jews. SJP calls for Israel's eradication.

statement on their Instagram story: "It is time for revolutionary escalation of the global student intifada for Palestine: A call from the Palestinian student movement in the Gaza strip. An appeal issued by the Palestinian student movement in the Gaza strip. To the global student movement to stop the genocidal war. It is time for revolutionary escalation of the global student intifada for Palestine" (9/25/24).

SJP at UNC Chapel Hill advocated to ban Jewish organizations from campus and demonized Israel in a student article titled: "Jewish students call out antisemitism amid SJP demands for 'No more Hillel,' SJP stated: "Zionism is a racist supremacist ideology advocating for the creation and sustenance of an ethno-state through the expulsion and annihilation of native people. Therefore, any group that advocates for a supremacist ideology — be it the KKK, the Proud Boys, Hillel, or Heels for Israel — should not be welcome on campus" (10/15/24).

SJP at George Washington University taped a "Notice of Eviction" flyer on a Jewish professor's door and filled the hallway with eviction flyers which targeted and denigrated the professor.

The flyer called for the professor's removal from the "imperial institution" and threatened continued action if the professor remained on campus. The language was incendiary and targeted the professor by name, framing him as a symbol of "Zionist" and "imperialist" oppression (2/24/25).

SJP at the Rhode Island School of Design and a student-run cafe, held an art show displaying artwork that demonized Israel, condoned terrorism, denied Jews self-determination. Artwork included an illustration of peace fingers with an inverted triangle, a symbol of Hamas's targets marked for elimination, a poster with the statement "NO REST WE WILL DIVEST," and an illustration with the caption, "there is no peace as long as the Zionist entity exists." (3/17/25).

sJP at CUNY Brooklyn College attempted to break into the Hillel after creating an encampment to pressure the university to divest from Israel. Faculty joined students in chanting and held a sign with the Hamas inverted red triangle (5/8/25).

SJP leaders support genocidal terrorists and its speakers mock the Holocaust and spread antisemitic conspiracies. They reject attempts at dialogue and strive to cancel and silence pro-Israel voices.

HATEM BAZIAN

SJP CO-FOUNDER / ANTISEMITIC / ANTI-PEACE / EXTREMIST

Hatem Bazian, a professor at the University of California at Berkeley, calls for no normalization or cooperation with Zionist students and academics and he rejects interfaith dialogue. Bazian denies the Jewish connection to Israel and shared content from the antisemitic website Mondoweiss.

"How come we don't have an intifada in [the United States]? ... It is about time that we have an intifada in this country that change[s] fundamentally the political dynamics in here. And we know... they're gonna say it's some Palestinian being too radical, well you haven't seen radicalism yet!"

—Hatem Bazian, 2004 rally in San Francisco

Bazian uttered these words during the Second Intifada (2000-2005), when stabbings, shootings, suicide bombers, and other terrorist attacks killed more than 1,000 Israelis and left thousands more injured. Civilians made up 70% of fatalities.

Bazian still teaches in UC Berkeley's Ethnic Studies Department, even though he routinely spouts Jew-hatred on social media and in the classroom.

ANTI-ISRAEL GROUPS THAT AREN'T SJP!

Faculty & Staff for Justice in Palestine

Unlike SJP, Faculty for Justice in Palestine doesn't appear to have a concrete founder. They are anti-Israel faculty and staff who have come together at roughly 130 chapters in the name of "Palestinian Liberation." They support BDS in all forms, including academic and cultural boycotts of Israel. They also claim that an "anti-Palestinian campus environment enables bullying, harassment, and discriminatory punishment."



They support SJP efforts on campus, which include encampments, harassment of Jewish students, faculty, and staff, and promote a one-sided, demonizing view of Israel.

Students for Democratic Socialism (DSA / YDSA)



While not exclusively focused on the Middle East, DSA chapters often endorse BDS and use their platform to spread antizionist rhetoric. On many campuses, they have co-sponsored protests with groups that justify terrorism against Israeli civilians and reject Israel's right to exist.

Palestine Solidarity Coalition (PSC)

PSC chapters frequently engage in aggressive, protest-based activism, including disrupting Holocaust remembrance events, targeting Jewish students with inflammatory accusations, and promoting maximalist slogans like "from the river to the sea," which is an antisemitic dog whistle for the destruction of Israel.



Muslim Student Association



activity, many MSAs have hosted speakers who promote antisemitic conspiracy theories, defend terrorist groups like Hamas, or frame Zionism as inherently racist. This contributes to a campus climate in which Jewish and pro-Israel students often feel alienated or threatened.

RIGHTWING PODCASTING-A PIPELINE OF BIGOTRY:

Why Podcasts Are So Effective at Spreading Hate

- <u>Unregulated Environment:</u> Unlike mainstream outlets, podcasts face little content moderation.
- <u>Long-Form Format:</u> Allows for the slow normalization of radical ideas through storytelling and repetition.
- <u>Parasocial Bonding:</u> Listeners often develop emotional loyalty to hosts, making them more susceptible to ideological persuasion.
- <u>Cross-Pollination:</u> Guests appear across multiple shows, reinforcing fringe ideas within overlapping audiences.



HAJJ AMIN AL-HUSSEINI

Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, Hitler Supporter, Antisemitic Propaganda Master

In 1921, the British appointed Al-Husseini Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, a position he used to incite violence against Jews. Eight years later, he spread false rumors about a Jewish plot to conquer Muslim holy places in the British Mandate for Palestine. They led to massive violence across the Mandate. The riots left 133 Jews, 10 Americans, and 110 Arabs (most killed by British forces) dead.

At the outbreak of WWII, the Mufti fled to Berlin. He met with Nazi officials in Germany, including Adolf Hitler, SS Commander Heinrich Himmler, and Adolf Eichmann. Al-Husseini wanted the Führer to stop deporting Jews from Nazi-occupied areas as many fled to the Mandate. Additionally, he prevented the evacuation of 4,000 Jewish children from the Balkan countries and 80,000 Jews from Romania to the Palestine Mandate, and he founded the Waffen SS Division in Bosnia and Herzegovina. The actions of this group led the Yugoslavian post-war government to label the Mufti a war criminal.



The Mufti's radio broadcasts also led to rioting in the Mandate starting in 1936, leading to the British issuing the infamous White Paper in May 1939, severely limiting Jewish immigration. These broadcasts also led to a 1941 pogrom in Baghdad against Mizrahi Jews. The Mufti wished for Hitler's efforts to eradicate world Jewry to reach the Middle East. In a 1943 telegram Heinrich Himmler sent to Al-Husseini, he likened the Nazi efforts to exterminate Jews to "the struggle of the freedom-seeking Arabs and particularly in Palestine against Jewish invaders" and wished the Mufti luck.

NAZI IDEOLOGY AND PALESTINIAN SOCIETY

The founder of the Palestinian National movement, Hajj Amin al-Husseini, was a committed ally and follower of Adolf Hitler and the Nazi regime, but that is far from the full extent of Palestinian-Nazi ties.

His nephew and successor, arch-terrorist Yasser Arafat, continued this legacy by including European neo-Nazis in his 'militant' groups, providing military training to German neo-Nazi groups in Lebanon, and involving neo-Nazis in their mass murder attacks, like the 1972 Munich Olympics massacre.







Mahmoud Abbas, the current Palestinian Authority President, financed the Munich Massacre and argued in his dissertation that Jews deserved the Holocaust.

Former Nazi Officer Kurt Waldheim was the Secretary-General of the UN who oversaw the ratification of the infamous 1975 "Zionism is Racism" resolution.

Neo-Nazis have regularly denied October 7th atrocities, significantly contributed to popular pro-Palestinian rhetoric by coining terms like "Jewish Supremacy," and continued to use the Arab movement's popularity to express their antisemitism.

After over 80 years of Nazi glorification in Palestinian society, this influence has embedded itself in their culture. There are department stores named "Hitler," copies of Mein Kampf are found in children's rooms, Nazi swastikas are proudly brandished at their protests, and the Nazi salute is often used and encouraged.







Founded in 2015, this NYC-based organization holds rallies where participants demand Israel's destruction and incite violence against Israeli civilians and Jews worldwide.

In March 2022, they called for protests outside of pro-Israel Jewish organizations that they characterized as "funding colonialism," listing their addresses so that their followers would know "who [their] enemy is."

A frequent rallying cry of WOL is to "Globalize the Intifada."

Nerdeen Kiswani is WOL's chairperson and co-founder. She defended Hamas's brutal attack on October 7th, 2023.

On that day, she posted on Instagram saying that supporting Palestine means accepting its liberation "by any means necessary."

On social media, she routinely posts in support of terrorist organizations and advocates for Israel's destruction.



PALESTINIAN YOUTH MOVEMENT



An extremist anti-Israel organization, PYM regularly demonizes and attacks Israelis and Zionists and lionizes terrorists as icons of Palestinian resistance. PYM not only eulogizes terrorists from PFLP, but also Hamas, Al Aqsa Martyrs Brigade, and PIJ with slogans like "glory to our martyrs." It has 14 active chapters in the US and Canada and routinely works and partners on events with various radical anti-Israel organizations.

These organizations include the Council on American Islamic Relations (CAIR), American Muslims for Palestine (AMP), Within Our Lifetime, Defence of Children International Palestine, Samidoun, and Addameer. The latter three are fronts for the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine. In 2025, the US Treasury imposed sanctions against Addameer for "prominent financial supporters of Hamas's Military Wing and its terrorist activities."



PYM is against peaceful solutions to the conflict. It views Israel as a Zionist colonialist project and plans to continue resisting, by any means necessary "until the land is rightfully [theirs] once more, and until [the Palestinian] people secure their right of return" and Israel is destroyed.

Chapters of Students for Justice in Palestine, Jewish Voice for Peace, and similarly-minded campus groups regularly share PYM's content. They advocate for BDS and have a complete anti-normalization agenda.

MOHAMMED EL-KURD

Anti-Israel Poet, Writer, and Activist

El-Kurd is a Palestinian poet, social media activist, and Jerusalem correspondent for The Nation. Like his journalism, his comments are full of misinformation and antisemitic drivel.

El-Kurd characterized Israelis as "thirsty for blood" and Zionists as "depraved," while justifying the bombings of Israeli civilians. This is an antisemitic blood libel. He also absurdly accused Jews praying at the Western Wall of an insidious plot to take over Al-Agsa mosque.



He also believes the New York Times is a Zionist publication.

He opposed the very idea of Israel's existence and has only gotten bolder since October 7th in his hatred of Israel and Zionism. He denies that Israeli women were raped, supports doxxing Zionists, makes fun of Israeli soldiers suffering from PTSD, and generally supports anti-Israel efforts on college campuses like the hijacking of university buildings.

WHAT IS J'Street?

J Street — and its campus branch J Street U — is an American Jewish NGO that claims to be a progressive, pro-Israel, pro-democracy, and pro-peace political action group committed to a two-state solution. Its actions tell a different story.

The group's annual conferences have provided platforms to various anti-Israel ideologues like Mustafa Barghouti (a leader in the BDS movement) and Rebecca Vilkomerson (a leader in Jewish Voice for Peace). It has also engaged with groups that downplay threats from Hamas and Hezbollah while harshly condemning Israeli responses to these groups. While claiming to support a two-state solution, they often disproportionally criticize Israel over Palestinian leadership and Iran.



In the last two decades, J Street has:

- Insinuated that pro-Israel American voters are racist
- Argued for a moral equivalence between Hamas and Israel
- Pushed conditioning US aid to Israel upon ending what it defines as "the occupation."
- Justified Palestinian terror attacks against Israeli civilians
- Supported the ethnic cleansing of Jews
- Denied Israel's right to exist

Since October 7th, 2023, J-Street has

- Urged for sanctions against Israeli officials
- Support the International Criminal Court's arrest warrants against Israeli leaders.
- Opposed the sale of arms to Israel.

J-Street U maintains the organization's "Pro-Israel, Pro-Palestinian" stance and maintains a presence on many US campuses.



WHAT IS JVP?

As an antisemitic and anti-Zionist "token" group,

JVP promotes a nefarious agenda behind its alleged

Jewish identity. Active on college campuses across the US, it spreads antiIsrael propaganda and campaigns for BDS, all while justifying terrorist
actions against Israel and the harassment of Jewish students on campus.

JVP was founded in 1996 and views itself as the "Jewish wing" of the Palestinian solidarity movement. However, as NGO Monitor and CAMERA have documented, JVP's true mission is to create a wedge within the American Jewish community, to generate the impression of division over Israel. It is routinely tokenized by other anti-Israel organizations as that of the "good Jews," despite many of its members not being Jewish.

Following the events of October 7th, JVP blamed Israel's blockade of Gaza for the attack. They advocate for a one-sided ceasefire and demand the end of US support for Israel.

WHAT IS THE "DEADLY EXCHANGE" CAMPAIGN?



In 2017, Jewish Voice for Peace initiated a campaign to end joint training exercises between US and Israeli law enforcement agencies. JVP alleges that Israeli law enforcement instills bigotry into their American counterparts, teaching them to violate civil liberties, human rights, and adopt techniques that encourage police brutality.

WHY IS IT WRONG?

JVP blames Israel and claims that American Jewish organizations like the ADL, AIPAC, and Birthright are responsible for facilitating these supposed misdeeds. Blaming American Jews and the nation-state of the Jewish people for phenomena that they do not control, such as police brutality, is an age-old antisemitic trope. According to Georgia State law enforcement, collaboration with Israel has made them better police officers. Attempts to impede this cooperation hinder law enforcement officers' ability to improve their practices and protect communities as effectively as possible.

WHO SUPPORTS THE CAMPAIGN?

The campaign has been endorsed by Students for Justice in Palestine (SJP). This organization glorifies terrorists such as PFLP leaders Ghassan Kanafani and Rasmea Odeh. It also disseminates vile propaganda against Israel. In Massachusetts, Tufts University SJP spearheaded an effort to become the first US university to end its police department's involvement with Israeli law enforcement. It received a "Collaboration Award" in April 2020 for its work on the campaign, drawing strong condemnation from Tufts President Anthony Monaco, who criticized the BDS movement as antisemitic. In 2022 Northeastern Student Government Association passed a Deadly Exchange resolution.

APARTHEID WEEK EXPOSED

The Hijacker Beloved by Anti-Zionist Activists Worldwide

During an October 21, 2013 BBC Radio 4 interview, Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine (PFLP) member Leila Khaled recalled her attempted hijacking of El Al Flight 219 from Amsterdam to New York City on September 6, 1970:



"I said OK, you don't want to open [the cockpit door], so I made like this – one hand up, one hand down – with the hand grenades. I count for three: if you don't open I will explode the plane."

According to the Israeli Shin Bet, Leila Khaled is a member of the Jordanian command of the PFLP. It is designated as a terrorist organization by the European Union, the United States, Israel, and Canada.

During a September 26, 2017 speech to the European Parliament, Khaled compared Israeli policy to that of the Nazis, asking, "Don't you think what happened in Auschwitz during the Holocaust is also a Holocaust comparable to what is happening in Gaza today?"

During an October 3, 2020 online event organized by the International League of Peoples' Struggle, Khaled glorified the murder of Israelis: "We see children going out, stabbing a settler or a soldier, using the cars... this is also resistance." She also threatened, "Israel is not a state to live. Israel is a state to be demolished." University chapters of Students for Justice in Palestine continuously reference her as a feminist icon and hero of Palestinian resistance.

While speaking in Wuppertal, Germany, on March 30, 2016, Khaled revered violence against Israel, insisting that "…negotiations [with Israel] will be held only with knives and weapons." During the same speech, she glorified Dalal al-Mughrabi, who led the Palestinian terrorist cell that perpetrated the Coastal Road Massacre — a brutal attack in Israel that left 38 civilians dead. Thirteen were children.

GHASSAN KANAFANI

Ghassan Kanafani was the spokesman for the terrorist organization Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine (PFLP). Israel assassinated him in 1972; however, his written works remain a staple for anti-Israel groups which lionize and celebrate him.



Examples of Kanafani's involvement in terrorism and of American student activists glorifying him:

- Kanafani, who served as PFLP spokesperson, met with members of the Japanese Red Army who committed the Lod Airport Massacre, murdering 26 people and injuring 80 in May 1972. The victims were largely Christian pilgrims from Puerto Rico.
- On November 13th, 2019, Emory
 University's chapter of Students for Justice
 in Palestine used a quote from Kanafani to
 justify an argument in an op-ed that those
 who "speak up on behalf of Palestine"
 should not engage in dialogue with
 Zionists.
- The Palestinian Youth Movement offers an "Annual Ghassan Kanafani Resistance Arts Scholarship."
- On January 28th, 2020, Cornell
 University's chapter of Students for
 Justice in Palestine shared a video,
 originally posted by the Central Ohio
 Revolutionary Socialists, in which
 Ghassan Kanafani rejects the idea of
 negotiations with Israel because he has
 "never seen any talk between a colonialist
 case and a national liberation movement."

- In December 2022, Columbia held a
 divestment reading group of revolutionary
 Palestinian literature; among works by
 Omar Barghouti, Mohammed El-Kurd, Leila
 Khaled, and others was a special discussion
 of Kanafani's book "The Man in the Sun."
- March 2023: SJP at UT Dallas screened the film "Resistance, Why?" which included interviews with Kanafani and other Palestinian "resistance" fighters. The documentary "[called] for openness, justice, the right to auto-determination, and for the Palestinian people to fight against the occupation, Zionism and imperialism." This was part of their Apartheid Week events.



ANTI-ISRAEL GROUPS IN CANADA

Solidarity for Palestinian Human Rights (SPHR)



SPHR chapters at Canadian Universities have promoted inflammatory narratives by framing Zionism as inherently racist and have supported "resistance" actions without distinguishing between armed combatants and attacks on civilians, contributing to hostile campus climates for Jewish students. On many campuses, they are just rebranded SJP chapters, although many Students for Justice in Palestine chapters still exist and behave similarly to their US counterparts.

Independent Jewish Voices (IJV)

IJV routinely denies the legitimacy of Jewish national self-determination, minimizes contemporary antisemitism, and partners with openly anti-Zionist extremist organizations. They use their identity to undermine Jewish communal consensus and provide cover for antisemitic rhetoric.

This network of Canadian academics supports the academic boycott of Israel and has issued statements falsely accusing Israel of apartheid and genocide while ignoring or excusing incitement and violence by Palestinian groups.

Student Unions (Canada)

Several Canadian student unions, including those at Concordia and McGill, have passed BDS motions and blocked Jewish or pro-Israel student participation in decision-making, creating exclusionary spaces where Jewish identity tied to Zionism is openly vilified.



UK PALESTINIAN SOCIETIES

Palestine societies exist across campuses in the UK and Ireland. EducationAboveAll.org lists 46 in the UK in total.

Palestine Societies (PalSocs) claim that they aim to raise awareness of Palestinian struggles, but often focus on delegitimizing Israel. PalSocs collaborate with national Palestinian organizations to promote BDS, organize protests against Israel, host anti-Israel speakers, and regularly harass Jewish students on campus.

Protesting Israel Events

PalSocs protest against Israeli or pro-Israel speakers and students on campus. They send out letter templates to encourage students to write to the administration or the student union, asking for a speaker to be deplatformed. These societies have violently protested Israelis on campus by harassing speakers and attendees of pro-Israel events. They are also closely linked to and support Palestine Action, a group that currently has members on trial on terrorism charges.

Pro-Palestinian Organizations in the UK

- <u>Palestine Solidarity Campaign (PSC)</u>: The leading national anti-Israel group, glorifying armed resistance without condemning civilian-targeted violence.
- <u>War On Want:</u> Its stated mission is to fight the forces of global poverty. In reality, their anti-Israel campaign far surpasses any of their humanitarian work.
- Friends of Al-Aqsa (FOA): A religious group named for Al-Aqsa Mosque (Temple Mount) in the Old City of Jerusalem. They promote BDS, call for a boycott of Israeli pharmaceutical company TEVA, and work with Palestinian student societies, particularly in London, to co-host problematic speakers and events.
- <u>Apartheid Off-Campus (AOC)</u>: A student-led independent network promoting BDS at UK universities. Their website provides a database of UK universities' financial links and investments with ties to Israel. In addition, they host the "Apartheid Off Podcast" and events with speakers.

CAMERA on CAMPUS UK

ILAN PAPPÉ

Anti-Israel Poet, Activist, & Discredited Historian

Ilan Pappé is an Israeli-born political science professor from Haifa. His parents fled Germany in the 1930s. In 2007, he left the University of Haifa for the University of Exeter in the UK.

Pappé has written several books on the conflict, Israel, the Palestinians, and the 1948 War. His work has been challenged and discredited by other historians and analysts. He has admitted to writing not in the interest of accuracy or truth but to promote his political ideology. As a result, fabricated material appears in his work.

"The Arabs will have to go, but one needs an opportune moment for making it happen, such as war."

In 2006, Pappé claimed that David Ben-Gurion wrote the above quote in a letter to his son. Yet, none of the sources he provided corroborate the quote, and he faced no consequences from the University of Exeter.

"I admit that my ideology influences my historical writings... Indeed the struggle is about ideology, not about facts. Who knows what facts are? We try to convince as many people as we can that our interpretation of the facts is the correct one, and we do it because of ideological reasons, not because we are truthseekers."

He propagates the lie that Israel committed a 2002 massacre in Jenin despite copious refutation (including UN reports) of the bogus claim. He continues spreading the libel that Israel committed a 1948 massacre in the town of Tantura. This is in spite of the researcher who "discovered" this apparent atrocity admitting before a district court judge that it was a fabrication. Despite all of this, Pappé is still regularly cited as a reliable source, no matter how often his material has been discredited.

APARTHEID WEEK EXPOSED



WHAT IS NA'AMOD?

An anti-Zionist "token" group of British Jews "seeking to end [their] community's support for the occupation, and to mobilise it in the struggle for freedom, equality and justice for all Palestinians and Israelis".

Na'amod spreads anti-Israel propaganda, campaigns for BDS, and offered to help Pete Gregson, a left-wing activist who perpetuates Holocaust denialism, arrange a UK speaking tour. In 2018, Na'amod members read out a list of names of people who had been killed in Gaza, the vast majority of them being Hamas terrorists. In their memory, the participants then recited the Jewish mourning prayer, Kaddish.

WHAT HAPPENED WITH GREGSON?

In July 2022, Gregson emailed Na'amod asking for help to organize a

UK speaking tour featuring senior Neturei Karta Rabbi Dovid Weiss and British-Jordanian academic Dr. Azzam Tamimi. Rabbi Weiss led a delegation at a "Holocaust Review" conference attended by many Holocaust deniers. He has also met with leaders of Hamas and Hezbollah on several occasions. Dr. Tamimi, an advocate of suicide bombing, has said he "longs to be a martyr" and asked, "what is so terrorist about [Hamas]?"

Gregson asked Na'amod for help with visiting every UK city with "a sizeable Muslim population". He stated that the tour would examine "the need for Hamas to be decriminalised". Gregson clearly signed off the email with "Pete Gregson (Chair) Campaign Against Bogus Antisemitism".

HOW DID NAAMOD RESPOND?

Na'amod responded with: "Hi Pete, That all sounds really good. We actually have a master doc for

venues that we use when organising events, i've attached it to this email. Is there anything else I can help with?" The email was signed off with, "In solidarity *Name of Na'amod member*"

WHO SUPPORTS THE CAMPAIGN?

The campaign has been endorsed by the National Union of Students (NUS), which has a history of anti-Israel bias and antisemitism, and causes many other issues for Jewish students on campus. NUS leads apartheid week and props up new anti-Israel groups on campus.

Since October 7th, Na'amod has noted that its members would not join a protest against antisemitism as they believe it is a clear rejection of the weekly Saturday "peace" protests that they support.

ANTI-ISRAEL GROUPS IN THE UK

Student Federation for a Liberated Palestine (SFLP)

SFLP has organised campus actions calling for the "dismantling of Zionism" and celebrated violent "resistance," including messaging aligned with known terror-affiliated narratives.





Scholars for Palestine UK

This network has published open letters accusing Israel of genocide and settler colonialism while supporting academic boycotts that undermine open intellectual exchange and target Israelis based on nationality.

Friends of Palestine Society

These societies, active across UK campuses, have hosted speakers with extremist records and promoted content that dehumanises Israelis and denies the legitimacy of a Jewish state.





The Revolutionary Communist Party & Marxist Societies

Marxist/Leninist student groups that frame Zionism as imperialism and frequently echo radical anti-Israel talking points, often dismissing antisemitism concerns as "Zionist propaganda."

They aim to overthrow capitalism and target institutions under the banner of anti-imperialism.

Palestine Action

Palestine Action is a militant, radical direct-action group that aims to "[end] global participation in Israel's genocidal and apartheid regime." They vandalise and occupy lawful businesses, factories, and offices. Eighteen members were arrested in connection with a violent break-in at Elbit Systems in August 2024 and face serious criminal charges.



Student Unions (UK)

Many student unions across the UK have passed BDS motions and failed to protect Jewish students from harassment, often refusing to adopt the IHRA definition of antisemitism despite documented incidents on campus. Many have openly discriminated against Jewish and Zionist students.


YACHAD

Yachad is a left-wing British Jewish organization that claims to empower British Jews to support a political resolution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Its members argue that the "Israeli occupation" denies millions of Palestinians their basic civil and political rights. Yachad presents a simplistic account of the Arab-Israeli conflict, ignoring Palestinian rejectionism and terrorism.

The organization leaves out key details to its supporters. For example, it shared an article about the land dispute in the West Bank village of Masafer Yatta, claiming that "Palestinian property is being demolished." What was omitted? The fact that the land has been a designated firing zone since the 1980s.

Furthermore, the Palestinian residents failed to prove they had permanent (as opposed to seasonal) residency on the land before it was used as a firing zone.





Regarding the situation in Sheikh
Jarrah, Yachad describes the Jewish
landowners as settlers. Through its
obfuscation of crucial facts, the group
implies that "settlers" are taking
ownership of Palestinian homes and
demanding that Arab tenants pay rent.

Yachad held a Kiddish for Gaza in February of 2022. The organization hosted Samer Sinijlawi, a Fatah activist, as a speaker at Limmud 2022, the UK's biggest Jewish learning festival. Yachad also brought Breaking the Silence Founder Yehuda Shaul on a speaking tour.

Since October 7th, Yachad has condemned Hamas's actions but called for an immediate humanitarian ceasefire within Gaza. The group wrote an open letter to Lord David Cameron about the "incoming famine" of Gazan citizens, a need for a return to the 1967 borders, sanctioning settlers, and supporting international efforts to rebuild Gaza.

The organization is against the forthcoming anti-BDS policy by the UK Government and opposes the moving of the UK Embassy to Jerusalem. They support the liberation of Palestine "From the River to the Sea."

THE BALFOUR PROJECT





The Balfour Project claims to promote peace between Israelis and Palestinians. However, it promotes a revised historical narrative that depicts the State of Israel as a product of British colonialism.

The organization campaigns for the UK Government to apologize for publishing the Balfour Declaration of 1917, the first official endorsement by a major global power of Jewish self-determination. Members also advocate for the UK government to recognize a Palestinian state on pre-1967 war lines.

The Balfour Project has hosted Israel's former Ambassador to South Africa, Ilan Baruch, and SNP MP Tommy Shepherd, an anti-Israel activist who frequently speaks at Scottish Palestine Solidarity Campaign-related events.



Francesca Albanese, the UN Special Rapporteur known for antisemitic statements and support for terrorism, spoke at the group's June 2023 conference on Human Rights in Palestine.

The Balfour Project has also been associated with the now discredited former Church of England Minister and known antisemite Stephen Sizer.

Since October 7th, the group has hosted J Street, Save the Children, Lawyers for Palestinian Human Rights, Ireland Palestine Alliance, and Sadaka for webinar sessions that come with a heavy dose of anti-Israel rhetoric.

ANTI-ISRAEL GROUPS AT ISRAELI UNIVERSITIES

Academy for Equality is a cross-cultural organization that works to develop ties between Israeli Universities and Palestinian academics to promote their solidarity with the anti-Israel Palestinian national cause rather than encourage coexistence.

Academia for Equality



They challenged the "Havatzelot" program that integrates academics at the Hebrew University, claiming that it expropriates a significant part of the academic space by transferring it to military control, a claim that was denied by the university's president and the University itself.



Balad

Balad is a student group active at Hebrew University, the University of Haifa, Technion, Tel Aviv University, and Bar Ilan. It is affiliated with the Palestinian nationalist political party in Israel of the same name. Members often meet with Palestinian public figures closely connected to terrorists and promote BDS.

Between October 10–12, 2024, students from Balad branches attended a conference in Ramallah hosted by the Democratic Students Association and the Jafra Student Association. They met with the wives of convicted terrorists Marwan Barghouti and Walid Daka, as well as with Amir Makhoul, described as a writer, though he was convicted of spying for Hezbollah. They also met with Saleh Hejazi, a BDS official.



HADASH

Hadash is an extreme leftist student group active at the University of Haifa, Tel-Aviv University, Hebrew University, and Ben-Gurion University. It is affiliated with the Arab Jewish communist party of the same name.



Hadash student activists often assert that Israel is a racist apartheid state, that the "Israeli occupation" began in 1948, and that Palestinians were ethnically cleansed from their lands. Since the Gaza war, members have repeatedly accused Israel of committing genocide.



Nakba Day protest at Tel Aviv University



Prof Nadera Shalhoub-Kevorkian, March 2024 podcast

For the Nakba Week events at the Hebrew University, the student organizers invited Prof Nadera Shalhoub-Kevorkian, a denier of the rape and massacre of October 7, to give a guest lecture. She taught at the university until a year ago and declared in a podcast that "the time has come to abolish Zionism, it cannot continue." She said Israelis act afraid when they walk by and hear her speaking in Arabic, "and they should be afraid because criminals are always afraid. They cannot dispossess my land, they cannot displace my people. They cannot kill and not be afraid, so they better be afraid."

Hadash students and adult members falsely accuse Israel of committing genocide and ethnic cleansing in Gaza without mentioning Hamas's brutal actions, nor the kidnapping and murder of Israeli Arabs.

On October 9th, Jewish MK and Hadash party member Ofer Cassif said on American media that "Israel wanted this violence" and signed a petition supporting South Africa's complaint against Israel at the ICC.





A socialist, Jewish-Arab political movement in Israel, that claims to advocate for peace, equality, social justice, and independence for Israelis and Palestinians. They operate at Israeli universities and have organized protests solely to attack Israel with little to mention of Hamas or other terror groups.

They receive donations from foundations, like the Rosa Luxemburg Foundation of the German radical left party Die Linke. Rula Daood and Alon-Lee Green, the Israeli national directors of the Standing Together movement, were included in the Time 100 Next list for 2024 due to their extensive pacifist activities.

Standing Together has drawn criticism for focusing primarily on Israeli actions while often ignoring the roles of groups like Hamas, Hezbollah, and Iran. The group has supported ceasefires, including with Hezbollah, without acknowledging the security risks involved.

In December 2024, Standing Together called for an unconditional ceasefire with Hezbollah, demonstrating serious ignorance about Israel's security and the intensity of the terrorist organization's genocidal efforts.





The disinformation the organization spreads could lead to serious harm to Israeli Arabs and Palestinians in the West Bank.

BREAKING THE SILENCE

WHO ARE THEY?

Breaking the Silence (BtS) is a largely European-funded Israeli NGO devoted to demonizing the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) with false allegations of "war crimes."

WHAT IS THEIR MISSION?

BtS was established "to expose the Israeli public to the reality of everyday life in the occupied territories" and to "demand accountability regarding Israel's military actions."

HOW DO THEY OPERATE?

BtS allegations against the IDF mainly consist of unverifiable and anonymous "testimonies" by a small and fringe group of IDF veterans. They base their testimonies primarily on vague memories, feelings, hearsay, or rumors.

WHO IS THEIR AUDIENCE?

BtS claims to address Israeli society; however, they mainly peddle their stories in the US and Europe. From time to time, they are even hosted by university Hillels.

ARE THEY CREDIBLE?

BtS accusers refuse to air their charges to the authorities, despite the IDF's call to provide specifics to follow up with investigations. Shrouded in anonymity, BtS accusers withhold the details and the identities of those allegedly involved in their stories.

IS ISRAEL CRITICIZED OR DEMONIZED?

BtS wraps itself in the mantle of "human rights" but offers neither evidence for its accusations nor solutions to the problems it alleges exist in the IDF. According to cofounder Michael Manekin, the motivation for publicly testifying against Israel is its "political significance." For BtS, this means the political agenda of demonizing Israel takes priority over the truth. Leading members of BtS's board of directors, including Chairman Miki Kratsman, have pushed anti-Israel boycotts and international sanctions.

B'Tselem, a Jerusalem-based nonprofit, wrote a report claiming to document Israel's alleged human rights violations. It was founded by left-wing Israeli intellectuals and politicians in 1989, during the first intifada.

"The Israel Information Center for Human Rights in the Occupied Territories was established out of concern for the security and the humanitarian nature of the State of Israel."

In reality, this organization manipulates data to justify its long-held campaign of defaming Israel in its defense against Palestinian violence and terrorism.

The group's donors are international organizations and governing bodies like The New Israel Fund, the European Union, and many others who support anti-Israel groups and causes. Between 2012 and 2021, the organization received 14.4 million dollars from foreign government sources. Although it hires Israelis and operates inside Israel, the group heavily depends on foreign donations.



B'Tselem claims to want accountability yet does not employ lawyers nor have a presence in the government to advocate change. Its efforts have failed to produce any human rights advancements and its claims of Israel's alleged crimes heavily rely on unscrutinized Palestinian sources.

Since the first intifada, it has used a myopic interpretation of the legal term "unarmed" as a lack of firearms rather than a lack of any items that can inflict mortal or great bodily harm. The dangers of rock throwing, Molotov cocktails, tire burnings, and rioting can forever be minimized if not entirely disregarded. This allows its members to suggest that the IDF unjustly used their "armed" weapons on peaceful and defenseless Palestinian protesters, despite worldwide acknowledgment that these things harm the environment and lead to loss of life.

CAMERA has routinely debunked B'Tselem's reports, including the apartheid libel.





Deconstructing Common Myths:

MISINFORMATION, LIES, AND DISTORTIONS

Anti-Zionist organizations on college campuses are loud, but there's no reason to be intimidated. Why? Because much of their rhetoric relies on easily disprovable falsehoods. Utilize CAMERA's resources to obtain the knowledge and tools needed to push back in the marketplace of ideas.

BREAKING DOWN THE DISAPPEARING LAND MAPS

Many major empires have conquered the land of Israel, but there has never been an independent Palestinian state. This map, presented on mock apartheid walls across college campuses and in the media, has many egregious errors that suggest that the Jews stole Palestinian land.



After WWI, the territory was under the British Mandate for Palestine. The map falsely shows any land not owned by **Jews as Arab-owned** when Jewish/Arab ownership was actually comparable. Most of the land was state-owned.

In 1947, the UN partition plan (Resolution 181) called for the area to be divided into a **Jewish state and an Arab** state, with Jerusalem as a separate entity overseen by the United Nations. The Jews accepted the partition plan, but the Palestinians and the Arab states rejected it and promised a "momentous massacre." On May 14th, 1948, as the British Mandate

ended, Israel declared independence and was invaded by five Arab armies and Palestinian militias.

The 1993 Oslo Accords established

1949-1967: Gaza is under Egypt, and Jordan controlled the West Bank, which it annexed after expelling the Jews. This map ignores roughly 5% of the land in

> Israel owned by Israeli Arabs. Jewish-owned land in the West Bank was taken by Jordan and used to build things like Palestinian houses and a refugee camp. After Israel's victory in the 1967 Six-Day War, Jerusalem was unified and opened to all religions, and Jews rebuilt the Jewish Quarter. Israel also took the Sinai from Egypt, which it

West Bank



- Historically referred to as Judea/Samaria and illegally annexed by Jordan in 1950.

WHAT ARE THE REAL OBSTACLES TO PEACE?

Violent Palestinian Anti-Normalization

A persistent rejection of Israel's right to exist—not just its policies—fuels incitement, glorifies terror, and undermines any foundation for compromise. This makes coexistence impossible because it denies the legitimacy of the Jewish state altogether. Since Jews would not be allowed to live in any Palestinian-controlled land, the goal of this movement is to either ethnically cleanse all Jews or commit another genocide from the river to the sea.

International Community Enabling Palestinian Refusal of Peace

Decades of diplomatic double standards and unconditional aid have allowed Palestinian leaders to reject negotiations without consequence. This international indulgence removes incentives for compromise and perpetuates the status quo. Additionally, the unique definition of Palestinian refugee status created by the UN exacerbates the refugee crisis and effectively imprisons millions of Palestinian descendants as stateless wards of oppressive countries.

The Power of Jihadist Terror Groups Backed by Iran and Qatar

Hamas, Palestinian Islamic Jihad, and others maintain armed control over Gaza and influence West Bank politics, with support from Iran and Qatar. They use violence against their own people to stifle internal dissent, reject Israel, and sabotage efforts toward a peaceful resolution.

Inept Kleptocratic Ideologues Monopolizing Palestinian Public Leadership

Palestinian politics remain dominated by entrenched, unaccountable elites who prioritize personal power and ideological rigidity over democratic reform or peacebuilding. Government corruption and repression silence alternative voices and stall infrastructure development, leaving Palestinian society heavily dependent on foreign aid to meet even basic needs. Additionally, the Palestinian Authority in the Eastern disputed territory continues to subsidize nationalistic violence against Jews and Israelis, incentivizing 10/7-level violence against civilians.

Indoctrination of Hatred in Palestinian Education and Media

From early childhood, Palestinians are exposed to textbooks, television, and social media content that glorify martyrdom and violence against Jews, erase Israel, and portray Jews as subhuman. This systematic indoctrination conditions generations to see peace and coexistence as betrayal rather than progress.

Israel Makes Compromises in the Hope it Will Eventually Bring Peace

Israel has repeatedly made unilateral territorial withdrawals and security concessions in the hope of fostering goodwill. However, for over 30 years, these gestures have been met only with increased Palestinian violence instead of reconciliation.



WHY IS THERE NO PALESTINIAN STATE?

1947: UN PARTITION RESOLUTION:

This initiative called for the creation of a majority Jewish and an entirely Arab state out of the British Mandate for Palestine.

The Jews reluctantly accepted, while Arabs and Arab Palestinians turned it down and promised genocide.

Had the Arabs accepted, there would have been no war with the Jews of Israel and, consequently, no Arab and Jewish refugee crisis

1993-1995 THE OSLO ACCORDS

These were a series of unresolved agreements between Israel and the purportedly reformed Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) that created a framework for peace and eventual Palestinian statehood by establishing limited Palestinian autonomy, but were never finalized as Palestinian leaders launched ruthless terror attacks against Israelis and rejected the continued validity of the Accords.



2000: CAMP DAVID SUMMIT

President Clinton hosted talks on a comprehensive plan including land swaps, with Palestinians to retain 95-99% of the West Bank. <u>Israeli PM Barak accepted the deal, while Yasser Arafat refused it and launched the Second Intifada.</u>

Saudi Arabian Ambassador to the US remarked to Dennis Ross "If Arafat rejects this, it won't be a mistake, it will be a crime."

2008: OLMERT PROPOSAL

Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert's plan would have annexed the major Israeli settlements to Israel and, in return, given equivalent Israeli territory to the Palestinians. It would have divided Jerusalem. <u>Mahmoud Abbas left the meeting.</u>

2020: TRUMP'S "DEAL OF THE CENTURY"

This proposal included the establishment of a Palestinian state with parts of East Jerusalem as its capital, on the condition that leaders stop inciting and paying for terrorism and disarm Hamas and PIJ. It also included a \$50 billion bonus for the Palestinian state. Israel would have full control of the settlements, with Jerusalem as its undivided capital. Palestinians rejected the proposal.

Do the Palestinians want a state of their own or do they want a Jew-free land? <u>If the Palestinians really want a state, why do they continue to reject all proposals?</u>





THE TRUTH ABOUT ISRAEL'S SECURITY FENCE

More than 1,000 innocent Israelis were killed by terrorists between 2000 and 2005. Here are just a few examples of the kinds of attacks carried out by Hamas and other terror groups.


<u>Dec 12, 2001:</u> 11 were killed and 30 wounded when three terrorists attacked a bus and several passenger cars with a roadside bomb, antitank grenades, and light arms fire near the entrance to Emmanuel in Samaria. Both Fatah and Hamas claimed responsibility for the attack.

Moment Cafe, March 9, 2003:

Hamas targeted a crowded coffee shop on a Saturday night in a west Jerusalem neighborhood.

11 young adults were murdered and 54 were wounded.





In response to the violence, Israel constructed a security barrier to impede the infiltration of suicide bombers and other terrorists into Israel. As a result, terror attacks decreased by 90%, and Israel saw a 70% reduction in civilians murdered by terrorists.

The barrier is not illegal under international law — it is, as the Jerusalem Centre for Public Affairs has noted, "a necessary and proportional response to a campaign of genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes by Palestinians."







FACT:

Palestinian guerrilla groups launched a violent and armed campaign against the fledgling Jewish state nearly six months before Israel declared independence. Then, on May 14th, 1948, the armies of Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon, and Iraq launched a war intended to destroy the newly created Jewish state and exterminate all of the Jews from the land.

As a result of the war, which the 'Arab side' started and lost, an estimated 500,000-600,000 Arabs fled the territory that would formally become Israel. Most Arab refugees left at the urging of their leaders or to avoid the fighting. Only a minority, who posed strategic threats to Israel's defensive maneuver behind Israeli military lines, were expelled.

About 150,000 Arabs remained in Israel after the 1948 Independence War. Israeli Arabs number 1.9 million today, about 21% of the country's population. Among them are 177,000 Christian Arabs. Israel is the only country in the Middle East whose Christian population has grown due to one of democracy's fundamental tenets: freedom of religion.

THE CLAIM: ISRAEL IS COMMITTING GENOCIDE



THE TRUTH:

Genocide isn't defined by death tolls, but by purpose. Civilian deaths in war, especially when terrorists operate from homes, hospitals, and schools, are tragic but not evidence of genocidal policy. Israel warns civilians, facilitates aid, and targets terrorists. In wars like Syria's Aleppo or Russia's illegal siege of Mariupol, civilian deaths were far higher and indiscriminate, but neither was accused of this crime. Calling Israel's conduct genocide dilutes the term and excuses actual genocidal actors.

No international court has found that Israel has genocidal intent.

In contrast, when Hamas deliberately targeted civilians for torture, rape, and execution, it was a publicly declared attempt to kill Jews because they are Jewish, a clear genocidal intent.









THE NAKBA NARRATIVE EXPOSED



Since Israel's Independence, a myth has taken root in the conversation in which Jews, as well-funded foreigners, stole Palestinian land and ethnically cleansed the native Palestinians from their homes. This became the Nakba, or "the catastrophe." For Israelis, the war of 1948 was a battle forced on the Jewish community by Palestinian militias and invading armies of five Arab states, leading to competing "narratives" about that period.

If the Jews had indeed ransacked Palestinian villages, murdered children in front of parents and parents in front of children, and expelled whoever was left, then Palestinian hatred for Israel and Jews would be understandable, as would their fundamental refusal to make peace. Though many accept this Palestinian narrative, it is false and contradicts basic historical facts. With a few legally justified exceptions, there were no expulsions, nor was there any policy of harming innocents.

The invading Arab armies were surprised to meet stiff resistance in 1948. Most Palestinians left due to the ongoing war, or the promises of Arabs to free the land from the Jews. They lost, and the Palestinian refugee problem was born. The largest group of Palestinian refugees, about 10 percent of the total, who came from the mixed Arab-Jewish city of Haifa, were not expelled. On the contrary, the Palestinians who fled Haifa did so against pleas from their Jewish neighbors and leaders.



Despite multiple international efforts, Palestinians unwaveringly refused negotiations for peace. This is a testament to the power of propaganda that so many Palestinians believe — falsely blaming Israel for the Palestinian refugee problem and the lack of a Palestinian state. It remains a potent myth and obstacle to peace, guaranteeing more suffering and deaths for all involved.



Did Israel Forcibly Sterilize Ethiopian Women Upon Arrival?



There was no intentional or forced
sterilization of Ethiopian women, period.
This canard accusing Israel of racism and sexism is false.

The smear originated from a 2012 episode of Vacuum, an Israeli television program hosted by Israeli journalist Gal Gabai.

NGO ANTI-ISRAEL BIAS

NGOs play a crucial role in exposing various atrocities, but some are criticized for having a bias against Israel due to an anti-Israel agenda promoted by their representatives.

HUMAN RIGHTS WATCH

Founder of HRW Robert Goldstein in 2009: "Human Rights Watch had as its original mission to pry open closed societies, advocate basic freedoms, and support dissenters. But recently, it has been issuing reports on the Israeli-Arab conflict that are helping those who wish to turn Israel into a pariah state."



Its former Deputy Director of Middle East Issues, Joe Stork, openly supported Palestinian terror attacks against Jewish civilians and opposed Arab peace treaties with Israel. He even attended a "Zionism and Racism" conference in Iraq sponsored by Saddam Hussein.

Human Rights Watch has lost critical perspective on a conflict in which Israel has been repeatedly attacked by Hamas and Hezbollah, organizations that target Israeli citizens and use their own people as human shields.



AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL

Secretary General Agnès Callamard tweeted that former Israeli PM Shimon Peres admitted that PLO leader Yasser Arafat was assassinated. However, he never said this. Even when corrected, she didn't delete the tweet.

She also denied that the IDF was threatened by Hamas in 2018 after the group urged its people to implement the "right of return" — planting explosives, shooting troops, and calling for the murder of Jews.

Saleh Hijazi, former Deputy Regional Director of the MENA Branch & Head of the Jerusalem Office, has a long history of anti-Israel activism. He opposes a two-state solution, advocates for the country's elimination, and campaigns for the BDS movement.

In Amnesty's 2022 Israel report, one of many misleading claims includes the group labeling Arab Israelis as "Palestinian citizens of Israel." However, a 2019 poll revealed that only 14% of Arab Israelis identify as Palestinian.

Amnesty's approach of "research, mobilization, and advocacy" is inherently flawed when the first step in the process is based on a biased agenda.





ANTI-ISRAEL "WASHINGS"

As anti-Israel activists seek new ways to villainize the country, they invent more libels that employ the "washing" suffix. It is a delegitimization effort, where in anything positive that Israel does is part of a nefarious plot to hide its crimes against the Palestinians.

TECHWASHING

Techwashing is the claim that Israel platforms its citizens' technological innovations to justify and/or deflect from its actions toward Palestinians. Techwashing is a variation of the classic antisemitic trope that depicts Jews as insidious and the source of misfortune for non-Jews. Israel's technological achievements and routine use of technology in warfare (not unlike most modern countries) are held to a double standard.

GREENWASHING

Charges Israel with pretending to be environmentally friendly to distract the world from its alleged mistreatment of the Palestinians. Those who push this narrative assert that Israel uses its land stewardship to harm the Palestinians. Therefore, Palestinians are justified in their violence to defend themselves from Israeli misdeeds, including "resistance" acts like spreading fire on Israeli land, burning rubber tires, uprooting Israeli trees deemed "invasive," and blaming Israel for major sewage and chemical leaks.

BLUEWASHING

Bluewashing is the accusation that Israel only sends humanitarian aid to countries and communities to deflect attention from the "crimes" it commits against the Palestinians rather than out of a genuine desire to help people in crisis. This is a clear double standard because no other country is similarly defamed for providing aid. Israel provides critical humanitarian aid in the face of global crisis and routinely affords that same assistance to the Palestinians, treating their politicians, children, and providing food and medical supplies to Gaza, despite continuous threats of rockets. .

PURPLEWASHING

<u>Purplewashing is the use of feminism in order to distract from or minimize a political agenda that has racist, political, or xenophobic goals.</u> When Zionists share that Israel is the freest country in the entire Middle East for women, they are criticized by anti-Zionists for pointing out this fact. Regardless of the conflict, the rights that women are afforded in Israel do stand out compared to its neighbors.

PINKWASHING

"Pinkwashing" advocates assert that Israel promotes its pro-LGBT stance to hide alleged crimes against Palestinians. They attempt to steer the conversation to Israel instead of many Arab countries' records on LGBT rights. Gay people in Gaza and the PA can face prison for up to 10 years, torture, social stigma, and death. As a result, many LGBT youth flee to Israel, even if it means living under house arrest.



OCCUPATION 101:

AN ANTI-PEACE FILM

"Occupation 101" excuses violence rather than encouraging peace. In addition, it fabricates history to evoke contempt for Israel, negatively impacting both Palestinians and Israelis.



The film:



Spreads age-old Christian libels against Jews and makes false claims, such as "the first converts to the teachings of Jesus were Palestinians." The first converts to Christianity were Jews.



Falsely claims that Israel had military superiority over the five Arab armies that attacked it in 1948. Shamelessly, the film tries to dupe viewers by using footage of Israeli forces in 1967.



Casts aside Jewish connection to Israel and dismisses the international legitimacy granted to the country, a vibrant democracy.



Excuses or brushes over decades of Palestinian terrorism against Israeli civilians. Israel's security fence is denounced with zero mention of the fact that it stops terrorist attacks.



Fails to mention the corrupt leadership of Yasser Arafat, who stole billions of dollars from his own people and actively promoted terrorism.



Legitimizes Hamas, the terrorist group that rules Gaza. It also ignores the use of Palestinians as human shields by Hamas and Islamic Jihad, terror groups that fire rockets from homes, schools, and hospitals.



5 BROKEN CAMERAS 5 HIDDEN TRUTHS




5 Broken Cameras is a 2012 documentary that purports to show non-violent Palestinian resistance to Israel's West Bank security fence. However, it portrays the Israeli-Palestinian conflict through a deceptive lens. It lacks context about why the fence was built, omits critical historical facts, and reduces the conflict's complex reality to a black and white picture that simultaneously demonizes Israel and absolves Palestinians of moral agency.

1. Scene Manipulation

Scenes are spliced together to conceal violent Palestinian provocations, like rock-throwing, that compel Israeli soldiers to react. A careful viewer may notice rock-throwing scenes that the filmmaker failed to edit out, hinting at the deceptive videography.

2. Anti-Terror Barrier

Before the barrier was built, Palestinian suicide bombers and snipers murdered and maimed thousands of innocent Israeli civilians. The barrier has helped end these attacks, saving Israeli and Palestinian lives.



3. Peace Rejected

The Palestinian leadership has rejected peace with Israel since before 1948. But unfortunately, instead of encouraging peace and reconciliation, the filmmaker teaches his son, Gibreel, that the only reason he doesn't try to kill an Israeli soldier is that he would get shot and not that it is fundamentally wrong to kill.

4. Palestinian Terrorism

The filmmakers fail to report Hamas's terrorist activities while showing Hamas flags flying high at the funeral of a Nil'in resident supposedly engaged in "non-violent" resistance. Hamas and Islamic Jihad have fired thousands of rockets at Israeli civilians since 2007. Some have even struck an Israeli hospital treating Palestinian infants.

5. PA Corruption

For years, the Palestinian Authority has misappropriated funds and aid for personal gain or to fund a sophisticated terror network instead of investing in infrastructure, schools, hospitals, etc. Ironically, the filmmaker admits that he was treated in an Israeli hospital after his car crash because "he probably wouldn't have survived in a Palestinian hospital."

FARHA EXPOSED



Farha is a 2023 Netflix film written and directed by Darin J. Sallam, a Jordanian filmmaker of Palestinian descent. The film takes place in 1948 during the war between Israel and its neighbors. IMBD notes that the film is about "A 14-year-old girl in 1948 Palestine watches from a locked pantry as catastrophe consumes her home." The film is fiction masquerading as fact.

Later in the interview, Shallam even admits that the name Farha is made up.




But Sallam revealed at the Toronto Film Festival that it was based on a story her mother was told by a woman she met who claimed she had been locked in a room in 1948. Sallam could not locate the woman and admitted the film was fictional.

"Why in fiction format? Because this is what I prefer to make as a film director fiction usually is more emotional, and I wanted to ... deliver emotion and communicate in an emotional way with people."

The film includes a horrific scene of Israeli soldiers massacring a Palestinian family and abandoning a baby to die. This was deliberately done to compare the Israeli forces and Nazi troops. Despite what magazines or anti-Israel student groups say, the film is a complete work of fiction.

The Truth About the Tantura Documentary



In 2000, Teddi Katz recanted his claim of an Arab massacre in Tantura village in 1948. Despite this, anti-Israel proponents like Ilan Pappe and campus detractors persist in spreading the narrative.

A 2022 documentary directed by Alon Schwartz revisits the alleged event. It left out key evidence and ignored historians that contest Katz and Schwartz's conclusions.

"Alon Schwartz's documentary, Tantura, is basically fraudulent. It's illogical that in 1948, the villagers, who did report rape, didn't mention the alleged 'big massacre' perpetrated in Tantura by Israeli troops. And subsequently, neither did Palestinian historians."

Although Morris was interviewed, none of his footage was included in the final cut.


"To me, it is clear that he simply didn't like what I said, because my comments weren't compatible with the narrative about Tantura that he wanted to sell his viewers: a <u>sensational, earthshaking tale</u> — 'the Jews behaved like Nazis' — that would garner him extensive publicity and perhaps even prizes from so-called Israel lovers abroad."

The film focused more on supporters of the alleged massacre than on those who disputed it, presenting an unbalanced perspective. Katz narrates the film and is portrayed as a hero. UN and Red Cross archives do not corroborate a massacre at Tantura, despite aiding its refugees. Neither the Arab Higher Committee in its memorandum titled "The Atrocities of the Jews" nor Palestinian historian Walid Khalidi mentioned the massacre in his 1992 book "All that Remains."

SRAELSM

Directed by Americans Erin Axelman and Sam Eilertsen, Israelism, political propaganda disguised as a documentary, frames Israel's actions toward Palestinians as rooted in a system of displacement, oppression, "apartheid," and "settler colonialism, while disregarding Israel's security threats and legitimate existence. The filmmakers show graphic scenes of apparent Palestinian devastation and despair without providing sufficient context.



VILIFICATION OF ZIONISM

The film depicts Zionism as a form of militarism and racism. It relies heavily on anti-Zionist voices like IfNotNow's (INN) Simone Zimmerman, whose mission is to undermine the connection between young Jews and Zionism. Zimmerman offers scenes of protests in New York City by INN members as evidence of a revolution underway in young American Jews' attitudes toward Israel. However, INN members are far-left radicals and do not reflect the views of mainstream American Jewry.

EXCUSING TERRORISM

The film presents a one-sided whitewash of Palestinian hatred, violence, and rejectionism. Even in the instance where it does depict Palestinian terrorism – the bombed-out shell of a Jerusalem Sbarro pizzeria, where a suicide bomber, in 2001, killed 16 people and wounded over 130 – the identity of the perpetrator remains ambiguous. Before the pizzeria is shown, scenes of an Israeli tank and security officers clashing with Palestinians make it seem the attack was somehow Israel's doing.

Israelism fails to inform viewers about the complexities of the Israel-Palestinian conflict, omitting key historical events like the Arab rejection of the 1947 UN Partition Plan and the ensuing war. It ignores internal divisions within Palestinian leadership and the role of militant groups like Hamas, contributing to misinformation and heightening polarization, particularly on U.S. college campuses.

Since 2005, IAW has spread across North

Q: IS ISRAEL AN APARTHEID STATE?



Apartheid was a horrific and brutal system of laws instituted by the government of South Africa from 1948-1994. Under apartheid, a privileged white minority oppressed a black majority, severely violating their human rights.

No comparable circumstances exist in Israel. All Israeli citizens are equally subject to the law. No laws prevent non-Jews from attending universities or serving in public or private sectors. Arab Israelis serve as politicians, judges, bank managers, and in high-ranking military positions.



Israeli civil law only applies to Israeli citizens. The Palestinian Authority and Hamas govern Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza, respectively.

Palestinians travel to Israel from the disputed territories for work, school, or religious services with permits. This is to keep people safe from Palestinian terrorism. Israel maintains checkpoints at border crossings comparable to any other sovereign country.

Since Hamas took over the Gaza Strip in 2006, they have continued to fire thousands of rockets at Israeli civilians from the territory. Hamas refuses to recognize Israel's right to exist. As such, land and sea crossings between Gaza and Israel remain closed to civilian traffic due to the threat of terrorism.

WHAT DOES "INTIFADA" MEAN?

Intifada (noun): A rebellion, uprising, or resistance movement. It is a term most often used to describe violence and terrorism perpetrated by Palestinian extremists.



THE FIRST INTIFADA

The first intifada spanned from 1987-1991. Over four years, Palestinian terror groups orchestrated hundreds of attacks on Israelis, including stone-throwing, arson, mass shootings, and suicide bombings. Victims included Jews, Palestinians killed in clashes with Israeli soldiers, and Israeli-Arabs killed by Palestinians for "collaborating with Israel." 160-185 Israelis were killed and thousands were injured.



September 2000 marked the start of the second intifada, a five-year terror campaign incited by Yasser Arafat, head of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO). Numerous terror groups participated, including Hamas and the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine (PFLP).

On August 9th, 2001, a Hamas terrorist walked into a pizza parlor on a busy intersection and committed a suicide bombing, killing 16 and injuring over 130.

By 2005, this period ended with over 1,010 dead and thousands more injured.

VIOLENCE AGAINST ISRAELIS DURING BOTH INTIFADAS WASN'T LIMITED BY ETHNICITY NOR RELIGION. THIS EFFORT IS NOT ABOUT THE PALESTINIANS, NOR FINDING A MUTUALLY BENEFICIAL SOLUTION.

HAMAS CHARTER 1988

Calls for the destruction of Israel and the Jewish people

"Israel will exist and will continue to exist until Islam will obliterate it, just as it obliterated others before it" (Preamble).

"The Islamic Resistance Movement is one of the links in the chain of the struggle against the Zionist invaders. It goes back to 1939, to the emergence of the martyr Izz al-Din al Kissam and his brethren the fighters, members of Muslim Brotherhood" (Article 7).

"The day that enemies usurp part of Muslim land, Jihad becomes the individual duty of every Muslim. In face of the Jews' usurpation of Palestine, it is compulsory that the banner of Jihad be raised" (Article 15).

Rejects peace and promotes antisemitic conspiracy theories:

"World Zionism, together with imperialistic powers, try through a studied plan and an intelligent strategy to remove one Arab state after another from the circle of struggle against Zionism, in order to have it finally face the Palestinian people only. Egypt was, to a great extent, removed from the circle of the struggle, through the treacherous Camp David Agreement. They are trying to draw other Arab countries into similar agreements and to bring them outside the circle of struggle" (Article 32).

Promotes terrorism and death:

"Jihad is its path and death for the sake of Allah is the loftiest of its wishes" (Article 8).

Asserts only Palestinians or Arabs have the right to the land:

"The Islamic Resistance Movement believes that the land of Palestine is an Islamic Waqf [endowment] consecrated for future Muslim generations until Judgement Day. It, or any part of it, should not be squandered: it, or any part of it, should not be given up. Neither a single Arab country nor all Arab countries, neither any king or president, nor all the kings and presidents, neither any organization nor all of them, be they Palestinian or Arab, possess the right to do that" (Article 11).

What Has Not Changed

1. Calls for the Destruction of Israel and the Jewish People.

"The Islamic Resistance Movement is one of the links in the chain of the struggle against the Zionist invaders." "Hamas rejects any alternative to the full and complete liberation of Palestine, from the river to the sea." Hamas continues to demand the full dismantling of the State of Israel and restoration of all of historic "Palestine." But drops religiously charged language.

"The Day of Judgment will not come about until Moslems fight the Jews (killing the Jews)... the stones and trees will say... there is a Jew behind me, come and kill him."

"Whatever has befallen the land of Palestine in terms of occupation, settlement building, judaisation or changes to its features or falsification of facts is illegitimate. Rights never lapse." The apocalyptic call to violence is removed, but the message remains: Jewish presence and control over any part of the land is illegitimate, must end.

2. Rejects Peace and Promotes Antisemitic Conspiracy Theories

"Our struggle against the Jews is very great and very serious."

"Hamas affirms that its conflict is with the Zionist project, not with the Jews because of their religion." The new version attempts to separate anti-Zionism from antisemitism, but the conspiracy rhetoric remains

"The Camp David Agreement... was treacherous."

"Hamas does not consider the Oslo Accords or any similar agreements to be legitimate."

Peace agreements are rejected as betrayals of the Palestinians.

3. Promotes Terrorism and Death

"Death for the sake of Allah is the loftiest of its wishes."

Resistance and jihad for the liberation of Palestine will remain a legitimate right, a duty and an honor for all the sons and daughters of our people and our Ummah."

The glorification of martyrdom is not as explicit, but the endorsement of violence remains: "honor" and "duty."

4. Asserts Only Palestinians or Arabs Have the Right to the Land

"The land of Palestine is an Islamic Waqf consecrated for future Muslim generations until Judgement Day."

"All of Palestine is a land of Waqf and an Islamic land that cannot be abandoned."

Both charters declare the land to be an inalienable religious trust, barring any form of territorial compromise.

LET'S TALK ABOUT TERRORISTS USING HUMAN SHIELDS

Human Shield: "a person whose body is used as protection from harm by someone else." (Merriam-Webster Dictionary)

Hamas regularly launches rockets at Israel from civilian areas including schools, mosques, and hospitals. Palestinian terrorists use civilians, including children, to shield themselves from Israeli retaliatory strikes; this illegal practice has deadly results. They also use civilian infrastructures to store weapons in apartment buildings and built an underground terror network under schools and international aid buildings. Hamas dominates the Gaza Strip and routinely fires at Israel, despite the country's complete withdrawal from Gaza in 2005.



By using human shields, Hamas and PIJ hinder Israeli counterstrikes, as the IDF takes measures to avoid civilian casualties. ISRAEL'S SIEGE OF HAMAS




Sieges are an important aspect of modern military operations designed to isolate enemy forces physically and electronically and are a legitimate tactic of warfare. Generally speaking, they are permitted as long as the siege is not deliberately aimed at starving the local population.

The sieging force has a qualified obligation to facilitate the delivery of food and medicine, but

only as long as they can be reliably delivered without being diverted for use by the enemy military force.

Since Israel imposed a siege on the Gaza Strip following the October 7 attack by Palestinian terrorists, it has facilitated the flow of food, water, and medicine into the territory, despite evidence that Hamas has diverted the aid for its own purposes.

ISRAEL'S BLOCKADE OF GAZA



A blockade is a military operation to prevent vessels from entering or leaving a coastal area, sometimes including airfields, under the control of an enemy nation. Israel has imposed a naval blockade on the Gaza Strip since January 2009 in response to over 5,000 missiles and mortar bombs toward Israeli territory. Blockades are allowed and regulated under international law. A United Nations panel of inquiry has stated that Israel's blockade of the Gaza Strip "was imposed as a legitimate security measure... and its implementation complied with the requirements of international law."

McGill's Encampment Era: Months Of Unchecked Protests Redefined the Campus And Antisemitism

On April 27th, 2024, I turned on my phone after Shabbat to find a message confirming what had long felt inevitable—an encampment had been set up at my school, McGill University. With all the student walkouts, <u>Palestine Liberation Month</u>, hunger strikes, and die-ins, I was hardly surprised when the encampment trend reached my campus.

What stunned me is that it would turn out to be the second-longest-standing encampment in North America, bringing 74 days of essentially unrestricted disruption.

Over those 10+ weeks, I watched as the encampment grew unimpeded. Nearly every day, I received an email from McGill "updating" me on the situation. In reality, though, they all seemed to say the same thing: "We're sorry, but we can't do anything". Even as instances of undeniable antisemitism came to light, including the establishment of a pro-terror summer camp for local children reminiscent of Hamas-run indoctrination programs and a violent takeover of the <u>administration building</u>, McGill and the Montreal police did nothing.

The dismantling of the encampment on July 10th did not bring respite from this chaos. One year later, the impact of the encampment remains evident, shaping campus life, school policy, and public discourse.

In early November 2024, the Student Society (SSMU) attempted to institute an <u>antisemitism policy</u>, declaring that the genocidal chant "from the river to the sea" or paying "disproportionate" attention to Israel does not qualify as antisemitism. This framing effectively dismissed the common concern among Jewish students that such rhetoric is threatening or exclusionary. By denying the antisemitic impact of this language, the policy sought to normalize the hateful language that is all too common on McGill's campus. In doing so, it risks fostering an environment where Jewish students feel increasingly unsafe, unheard, and marginalized.

No Jewish organizations other than the explicitly pro-Palestinian group, Independent Jewish Voices, supported the policy.

Although the policy was initially rejected after a hearing where students from Chabad, Hillel, and Students Supporting Israel had the chance to voice their concerns, the effort was in vain. Less than a month later, the motion was quietly passed—this time without prior notice to Jewish Groups.

That same month, the Quebec Superior Court suspended the motion, citing a violation of the SSMU's constitution. Yet, four months later, on April 9th, 2025, after some slight editing and artful wordsmithing, the student union pushed the policy through once again, leaving Jewish students, myself included, feeling ignored and unprotected.

Those four months, essentially the entirety of the second semester, offered no break from the rising hostility. The physical reminders of the hatred toward Israel and Jews were inescapable on campus: 30 <u>smashed windows</u> in McGill's largest building. While the blood-red "<u>free Gaza</u>" and an inverted triangle(a symbol used by Hamas to indicate targets) had been mostly scrubbed off, shattered glass and boarded-up windows were still there two months later.

Arrests, suspensions, and expulsions have yet to be made, epitomizing McGill and law enforcement's inability or refusal to hold their students accountable for the destruction of property and the promotion of violent ideologies.

It was not until after the April 4th Student Strike for Palestine that McGill took action.

That day, students and professors were <u>physically blocked</u> from entering their classes and others were <u>barricaded</u> inside lecture halls and classrooms by protestors carrying signs—all as chants rang out in support of a group responsible for murder, kidnapping, rape, and other horrific acts.

It was not until this April 4th student strike that McGill finally felt compelled to act. During the protest, demonstrators broke into the Dean of Engineering's office, assaulting a staff member and spraying them with <u>red paint</u>. This escalation left the administration with little choice but to respond.

hree days later, McGill suspended their Memorandum of Agreement with the SSMU, citing the organizations' explicit refusal to dissociate with groups that no longer have recognized status as a McGill Club (Student's For Palestine's Honour and Resistance status was <u>revoked in September</u>) and because they had been found to have "endorsed or engaged in acts of vandalism, intimidation, and obstruction as forms of activism."

The group's involvement in the April student strike that made students and faculty feel "threatened, intimidated, and unsafe" was cited specifically in an email sent to the entire student body.

I'm glad the administration is finally paying attention, but it's hard not to ask: why did it take eight months—and only after non-Jewish students and faculty were targeted—for them to step in?

The suspension of SSMU's MOA is a step in the right direction, but there is still so much more work to be done. To truly support its students, the McGill administration must take concrete steps beyond reactive statements. This includes adopting a clear, consensus-based definition of antisemitism, such as the IHRA working definition, to be used as a framework for evaluating instances on campus. The university also must renew its commitment to punishing protestors who brazenly destroy McGill's property, ensuring that students no longer think they can get away with vandalism. Additionally, McGill should establish clear guidelines around protest activity so that no student or faculty member is physically blocked from entering classrooms or academic buildings, and uphold every student's right to access their education safely.

As I look ahead to my remaining two years at McGill, I can only hope this marks the beginning of a new chapter—one defined not by unchecked hostility and disruption, but by genuine dialogue, academic integrity, and a shared commitment to safety for all students.



How Student Journalistic Ignorance Fuels Extremism

It would be unthinkable for college students to celebrate <u>9/11</u>; such an event would be denounced across mainstream news. However, when students at the University of California, Davis <u>celebrated the 10/7 terrorist attack</u> in Israel, the California Aggie student newspaper decided to glorify the spectacle.

The article in question reported on the demonstration by radical groups including Students for Justice in Palestine (SJP) on October 7th. The Aggie described the pro-Hamas groups as merely part of a "diverse set of movements," without mentioning any of their hateful rhetoric.

This is surprising, considering that pro-Hamas students engaged in a plethora of antisemitic and genocidal chants:

- "By soul, by blood, we'll defend you oh (Masjid) al-Aqsa"
- "There is only one solution intifada revolution"
- "We don't want no two state, we want all of 48"

These slogans, found often among other anti-Israel college groups, are explicit <u>calls for terrorism and genocide</u>.

Appeals about the al-Aqsa mosque in Jerusalem have been used by Palestinian terror groups as <u>conspiratorial evidence</u> to justify mass violence against Israeli civilians since the twentieth century.

Naming the Intifada references two major <u>violent Palestinian uprisings</u> against Israel, during which Hamas gained notoriety for targeting innocent civilians with <u>suicide</u> <u>bombers</u>, while urging <u>indiscriminate violence</u> against Israelis.



How Student Journalistic Ignorance Fuels Extremism

To "want all of 48" rejects the notion of a peaceful two state solution between Israelis and Palestinians and advocates for the destruction of Israel's Jewish population. Originally the land was to be <u>partitioned</u> for both peoples, but was rejected by Palestinians in 1947. In 1948, Israel was established as a nation and its neighboring <u>Arab states rejected</u> the Jewish state's establishment, immediately invading with the intent of destroying Israel. The chant advocates for Palestinians to forcefully obtain all land from 1948 through the destruction of the Jewish population.

If that wasn't enough, the speakers engaged in antisemitic dog whistles about Jewish greed and power. At one point, while speaking about American aid to Israel, <u>one speaker</u> proclaimed, "Their [our politicians'] pockets are in line with defense contractors and Zionist lobby money."

Nobody refers to non-Jewish Zionists in these kinds of contexts. As MLK Jr. famously said, "When people criticize Zionists, they mean Jews." Further, the accusation that Jews use an inordinate amount of money to secretly influence power to the detriment of the rest of the world is a dangerous libel that first gained popularity over a hundred years ago in the notoriously <u>debunked antisemitic creed</u> called the Protocols of the Elders of Zion. It is another despicable lie that has often been used in its history to justify the <u>persecution and mass murder</u> of Jews.

It is unsurprising that a student group who <u>openly supports Hamas</u> also promotes such slanderous bigotry.

Unfortunately, UC Davis is no stranger to this kind of <u>rampant antisemitism</u>. In one recent egregious case, university administration failed to fire a professor under investigation for inciting violence against journalists and their children online. Three days after the 2023 Hamas massacre, Professor Jemma Decristo <u>posted</u>: "Zionist journalists have houses with addresses, kids in school ... They can fear their bosses but they should fear us more." The message noted that "we have easy access" to [Zionists] "in the US," followed by blood-tinged knife and axe emojis.

The Aggie had every opportunity to call out the clear antisemitic rhetoric, but for some reason, ignored it completely.

The Aggie reported that the pro-Israel groups chanted, "hate is not resistance," an obviously incorrect report which should have been caught by the Aggie editors. While the student reporters may have misheard the chant, it is troubling that they both refused to conduct a basic check with students who were present and opted not to publish the many antisemitic chants during the rally. Additionally, Aggie staff incorrectly reported on the chants used by Jewish counterprotesters. The pro-Israel groups chanted, "rape is not resistance," refering to the mass usage of sexual violence during the October 7th massacre and refuting the pro-Hamas characterization of the massacre as "resistence."

The Aggie's decision to both omit the voices of Jewish students from their article and basic context for the <u>October 7 massacre</u> speaks volumes for which communities the California Aggie prefers.

Professors also attended the rally in support of Hamas who all seemingly did not have any concerns about attending a protest that celebrated the anniversary of the massacre. One of them was identified as Stacy Fahrenthold, an associate professor of history. I contacted Fahrenthold for a comment but received no response.

As a student at UC Davis, I would not expect every student journalist to be knowledgeable on any geopolitical conflict, but there is a difference between attempting to give a balanced assessment and choosing to provide a platform for extremist hate groups like SJP while wholly ignoring the voices of Jewish students who do not feel safe on campus

The Jewish and Israeli communities I love at UC Davis do not deserve the attacks leveled against us by these activists and it is frustrating that the Aggie blindly offers legitimacy to such behavior.

Student reporters could benefit by implementing mandatory <u>antisemitism training</u> when first hired at the Aggie. To the reporters of the California Aggie I say this: the Jewish and Israeli students here do not trust you, please prove us wrong.

On Friday, Oct. 18, UC San Diego's Sixth College writing department hosted a public conversation with Viet Thanh Nguyen as part of its yearly Culture, Art, and Technology Conversations series. Rather than speaking about how national identity and the media shaped his thoughts about war as a Vietnamese refugee — the topic he was actually invited to speak about — the Pulitzer Prize winner imposed his beliefs on what opinions are "acceptable" for Jewish people to hold and what constitutes antisemitism. Higher education institutions like UCSD must take responsibility to ensure that their students have access to facts that allow them to develop their own informed opinions, rather than influencing them to accept a hateful and biased narrative like the one-sided perspective presented by Nguyen.

By facilitating this event, UCSD gave a platform to this scholar who used it to spread biased and inaccurate information about the Middle East. UCSD has experienced <u>an influx of Jew-hatred</u> since the mass casualty terror attack by Hamas in October 2023, the <u>worst massacre</u> of Jewish people since the Holocaust. This act is one of many by UCSD that blatantly displays its insincere attempts to address this increase in Jew-hatred.

It is difficult to believe that Sixth College was entirely unaware of the contents of Nguyen's talk, given the title of the event, "Memory, History, Identity: From Viet Nam to Palestine" and Nguyen's public support of organizations and statements related to the Palestinian cause. Though private conversations with the event organizers have made clear that they do not necessarily endorse the beliefs of any speakers hosted for CAT Conversations — nor was it their intention for Nguyen to speak this way — the department has taken no public action to represent opposing viewpoints. Without other perspectives, students do not have the adequate resources to form a comprehensive understanding of this issue.

Over a year after Oct. 7, anti-Israel, anti-Jewish, and anti-American sentiment continues to pervade UCSD's campus. Nguyen's insensitive and untimely use of the Israel-Palestine conflict to virtue signal is both harmful to those being <u>targeted</u> by this biased misrepresentation and to the intellectual integrity of the academic institution.

In his talk, Nguyen proudly bragged that he signed a letter last year calling for a ceasefire shortly after Oct. 7 and that he participated in an encampment on a college campus the following spring, as if to share his fashionably moral pro-Palestinian bona fides.

The <u>letter</u> that Nguyen signed minimizes civilian casualties on Oct. 7, makes no mention of the hostages still held in Gaza, and uses language that protects and justifies Hamas terrorists and their actions. While he claims this letter was in the pursuit of peace, in reality, it was far from it.

Under the guise of "ending" the war in Israel and Gaza, letters like these have been extremely one-sided, advocating for Israel to lay down its arms without a mention of <u>Hamas' violence</u> against Israel or any demands for them to refrain from committing more atrocities.

Nguyen's support for this letter illuminates the moral failure of his positions and the publicity of his harmful viewpoint. It calls on Israel to forgo its right to self-defense and negotiate with a genocidal terrorist organization. In reality, negotiation would be impossible given that Hamas just rampaged through <u>Israeli communities</u> — kidnapping, murdering, raping, and torturing its citizens — and <u>promised</u> to carry out such barbaric attacks until all of Israel is eliminated.

The underlying message of Nguyen's speech echoed the letters' sentiments: His advocacy is not toward an ultimate goal of peace, but instead for the victory of genocidal terrorists — a viewpoint that a quick internet search could unveil. Sixth College clearly did not do enough research before inviting a speaker whose views only further fragmented the UCSD community and targeted Jewish students — or perhaps, they simply did not care.

At one point in the speech, Nguyen — who is not Jewish — declared that "one can be Jewish and opposed to Israel at the same time." This is true; it is fair for anyone to express opposition to Israeli policies, but for one to be opposed to the existence of the sole Jewish state strongly suggests an antisemitic double standard is at play. For the over 80% of Jews who recognize Israel as the religious and cultural center of global Jewry and understand it to be the only country that protects Jewish life without hesitation, this sentiment is not only inaccurate but also profoundly dangerous.

Later, Nguyen claimed to be cut from the same cloth as Martin Luther King Jr., equating his anti-Israel activism to MLK's public rebuke of the Vietnam War. Nguyen, a successful, Americanized intellectual, pushing his ideological slander in the face of potential financial and social rebuke and isolation is hard to swallow. It's also a bit ironic, considering the substantial and unencumbered national platform Nguyen continues to enjoy, as well as the general proliferation of pro-Palestine talking points impossible to escape on most college campuses.

To self-righteously compare himself to MLK is to insult the memory of the latter. MLK advocated for equal rights and an end to the Vietnam War, a war the United States was waging on a vulnerable population. Nguyen is advocating for Israel to forgo its right to self-defense in its own ancient homeland — where it is a vulnerable minority surrounded by 19 Arab countries — against a genocidal terrorist organization devoted to its destruction.

It is the epitome of privilege and hypocrisy for Nguyen to base his entire career on protecting the self-determination of the Vietnamese and then use his legitimacy to attempt to take away those same rights from Jews, who have fought and died to protect these rights. He is profoundly misguided and has poisoned his legacy with antisemitic beliefs about the evils of Israel.

The University clarifying its commitment to disavowing hateful perspectives would be especially important after the local Students for Justice in Palestine chapter — a student organization <u>banned on campus for illegal activity</u> — wrongfully advertised this event as their own and removed the post from Instagram only after the event occurred.

Sixth College's <u>mission</u> is to "create an inclusive community dedicated to and built on fostering curiosity and critical inquiry." The time has come for them — and for UCSD as a whole — to begin upholding these values, not only in words but in practice as well. We must cultivate an environment where diverse ideas can be explored thoughtfully and completely, where one-sided narratives and misinformation are not met with departments passively distancing themselves from their own events, but with discussion and academic dialogue.

A shrill voice screamed into a megaphone outside Queen's University Belfast during a recent visit by the former US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton. The air held an escalating energy.

"They will kill anyone, they will do anything, to make sure Palestine does not exist anymore!"

I did not want to affiliate myself, but I hovered at the crowd's edge, students and citizens who needed only a spark for chaos to erupt. "We are all Palestinians!" The crowd started chanting.

That last remark is common at these protests. But in Northern Ireland, it bears a heavier meaning.

For over a year, I have lived amidst the post-violence embers of one of the world's <u>longest-standing national conflicts</u>. Just as Belfast is deeply divided into Protestants and Loyalists versus Catholics and Republicans, other global conflicts are framed across the same lines. This, unfortunately, is one of the main reasons why Israel has characterized Ireland as one of the most systemically <u>anti-Israel nations</u>, especially following the recent closure of the Israeli Embassy in Dublin.

Many protestants in Northern Ireland began flying <u>Israeli flags</u> in 2002, not motivated by direct support of Israel as much as a response to the raising of Palestinian flags by the Catholic community. In many ways, these flags have been detached from their origins and have morphed into political symbols that represent the evolving ideas of Northern Ireland's political divide over time. This is all to say that the entanglement of Ireland and Palestine is historically rooted.

And so, Palestinian flags waved. The shouting continued but had now devolved into wordless screams. Then the spark came. A group of protestors jumped the barricades and rushed into the lines of security officers and police. Four were arrested.

Based on first-hand experience observing the situation here, the ongoing war in Gaza, and a basic grasp of the history of the two regions, it is clear that the direct comparisons these protestors promote are fueled more by ideology than fact.

The unjust simplifications and ignorance exhibited by these vociferous anti-Israel protesters that are amplified by cultural, media, and governmental sources blind the path for a true solution, contribute towards a wrong perception of Israel on the world stage, and embolden the Palestinian terrorists who wouldn't blink twice at <u>kidnapping or murdering Irish nationals</u> if given the chance.

In discerning the two histories, the British treatment of the Irish starkly differs from Israel's treatment of Palestinians in a number of ways, while ironically sharing more than a few parallels between the British and the Jews – both before and after the establishment of Israel.

The British historically sought to dismantle Irish culture and identity, exemplified by their <u>bans on the Irish language</u>, <u>confiscation of land</u>, and economic policies that worsened the devastation of the <u>Potato Famine</u>.

By contrast, Israel's approach to the Palestinians is fundamentally different. While protestors often accuse Israel of seeking to erase Palestine, such claims ignore the facts. Israel has never aimed to destroy Palestinian culture or people but to defend itself against groups like Hamas, which <u>explicitly call</u> for Israel's destruction.

This is evident in the current war in Gaza, where the Israeli Defense Forces (IDF) strive to minimize <u>civilian casualties</u>, even while Hamas uses civilians as human shields. As Jennifer, an Israeli EMT displaced for over a year due to violence, stated: "We're not trying for them to be like us...we want them to be them and to learn to live in peace with us. They can get so much from us...but they are being influenced by Hamas."

Hamas and Hezbollah control their populations through <u>censorship</u>, <u>suppression of dissent</u>, and <u>violence</u>. Hamas arrests and tortures opponents, executes alleged collaborators, and violently disperses protests. Hezbollah intimidates critics, enforces political dominance, and controls Lebanon's Shiite population through social services. Both use media propaganda to shape public perception.

Irish resistance during British rule, in contrast, was grassroots and driven by a desire for national freedom, not the obliteration of other people. Ireland's fight for independence sought to reclaim autonomy and culture, not to eradicate Britain.

Ironically, the parallels between the British treatment of the Irish and the British treatment of Jews reveal deeper historical commonalities. The British enacted policies that <u>suppressed Jewish immigration</u> and often aligned with Arab colonial resistance to any Jewish self-determination, before, during, and after the Holocaust and Israel's establishment. Both the Irish and the Jews experienced systemic oppression and were viewed as obstacles to British imperial ambitions.

While Ireland's relationship with Israel has since evolved, the foundational differences remain clear: Hamas's violent goals and targeting of civilians starkly contrast with Irish nationalist movements, and Israel's defensive efforts, including <u>providing Gaza with resources</u> even during wartime, are a far cry from Britain's harsh colonial policies. The oversimplification of these conflicts obscures critical distinctions and historical truths.

It is no coincidence that these Irish anti-Israel provocateurs are active in and near higher education. Political and ideological historical narratives shape collective identity and individual action, and Queen's has a long history of <u>contributing</u> to the development of Irish historical revisionism. Why Irish national consensus has overwhelmingly sided with the Palestinians for seemingly arbitrary, or at least non-historically factual reasons, is a subject for another conversation. The importance here is to address the faulty method of the blind and zealous identitarian belief that has been exacerbated by the globalized debate on Hamas's continued atrocities and the Jewish right to survive in the Middle East.

The only way to fight this societal disease of the mind is to encourage students to fight for understanding instead of recklessly forming crowds and chanting meaningless slogans. Though not all perspectives are created equally, it's nevertheless important to seek out as many differing perspectives as possible, because as history has shown in both parts of the world, the historical narratives you are taught don't always give you a full picture of reality.

No matter what these violent protestors believe or the prejudices still dominating Irish public discourse, hostages are still suffering. Civilians are still intentionally put in harm's way. Rockets are still falling. Soldiers face excruciating dilemmas against enemies who do not care for innocent lives. Our duty as world citizens is to work toward a situation where the war can end without allowing the evils of the past to repeat. Yelling at Jews to "Free Palestine" won't achieve this. Freeing Gazans and the hostages from Hamas and its deadly ideology might.



Pro-Palestinian Activism is Degrading Concordia

The Concordia Student Union's (CSU) "emergency" General Assembly on January 29th was never going to be a fair process. Organizers expected 700 registered students but were overwhelmed by nearly 1,000 attendees. The Q&A session and structured debate were scrapped, and the motion rushed to a vote. Jewish students and opponents of the motion knew their voices would not be heard. The result? An 885 to 58 <u>loss.</u>

Reports describe a packed room where many wore masks distributed by CSU staff. Fliers before the event instructed activists to <u>conceal</u> their identities, facilitating anonymous <u>intimidation</u>. A weak verification process raised concerns that non-Concordia students participated. The Concordia chapter of Solidarity for Palestinian Human Rights (SPHR) <u>coordinated</u> with SPHR McGill, further fueling suspicions of outside interference.

This was not a democratic referendum but an outcome engineered by external activists. Video evidence captured students <u>openly praising</u> Yahya Sinwar, the Hamas leader responsible for the October 7th massacre of Israeli civilians. A moment that should have prompted immediate condemnation from Concordia's leadership was instead met with silence. The message? Extremism could thrive unchecked.

The BDS demands were sweeping. CSU mandated full divestment from financial investments associated with "militarized violence, war, colonialism, apartheid, and genocide." This vague language ensures anything remotely tied to Israel is blacklisted overnight, affecting companies, researchers, and individuals.

Engineering students could lose internships at top tech firms. Professors on the verge of AI breakthroughs might see their research funding pulled. Entire fields—cybersecurity, aerospace, and international relations—face severe cuts. The Azrieli Institute of Israel Studies and the Institute for Canadian Jewish Studies, which provide essential research and funding, are directly threatened. This policy could strip students and faculty of hundreds of thousands of dollars in resources.

BDS also demanded an end to employment partnerships with Bombardier, Lockheed Martin, CAE, Pratt & Whitney, and Airbus—some of Quebec's largest aerospace and engineering employers. Concordia's engineering and business programs rely on co-op placements, <u>internships</u>, and job pipelines with these firms. If this motion is enforced, students will lose career opportunities, business students will see recruiters vanish, and faculty will struggle to secure <u>grants</u>.

These are not abstract concerns. They are real consequences for students with no connection to the conflict, now forced to sacrifice their futures for a <u>morally bankrupt</u> political agenda.

Another demand: sever all ties with Israeli universities and permanently ban future partnerships.

What does this mean? Medical students collaborating on <u>cancer treatments</u> with Israeli researchers will see doors slammed shut. Environmental science students researching <u>water conservation</u> will lose access to world leaders in <u>desalination technology.</u>

Higher education should be about intellectual exchange and global collaboration.

Instead, BDS activists have declared war on their own peers and professors, imposing ideological purity tests that restrict academic freedom.

The most alarming demand? Amnesty for extremist activists charged with violating the university's rules during "solidarity actions."

These were not minor infractions. Activists <u>blocked school buildings</u>, disrupted operations, and harassed Jewish students. A Quebec judge described their <u>actions</u> as creating a "valid, immediate, and imminent fear for physical security." This is the same network that held a rally in November where attendees were filmed giving <u>Nazi salutes</u> and chanting violent threats.

The CSU's demand that these individuals face no consequences is a clear admission that their movement relies on intimidation and fear.

With the BDS motion heading to a February 6th board of governors vote, Jewish students wonder: Will the administration stand for student safety and academic integrity, or cave to intimidation?

The January 29th event violated <u>Concordia's Code of Rights and Responsibilities</u>, which bans discrimination and harassment. It may also breach <u>Canadian anti-discrimination laws</u>, including the <u>Charter of Rights and Freedoms</u>. Even Parliament formally condemned BDS in 2016, recognizing its <u>discriminatory nature</u> and potential to incite hatred.

Concordia's leadership must investigate procedural failures at the CSU meeting, hold violators accountable, protect at-risk departments, and reaffirm its commitment to academic freedom.

While the Jewish community likely sighed with relief when the school decided to <u>prohibit</u> the CSU from booking any more spaces, the outcome of the Board of Governors' vote last week on this issue is still unclear. Will Concordia protect its students and academic integrity? Or will it surrender to extremism, sacrificing credibility, partnerships, and students' futures in the process?

Of course, even if Concordia continues its relatively new trend of acting responsibly, SPHR and their ilk will continue openly supporting mass murderers. They <u>said as much</u> on the day of the vote.

Hopefully, one day, enough ordinary Québécois will see these activists for what they are: violent, privileged, fools.
